The detail of children's moves has been regularly examined and steps taken to ensure that where a child has to move this is to the best match placement available. A new social care structure (five locality teams) has been in place from 19 January. There is additional resource and a different allocation system, both of which will increase the number of CAs completed within timescales. This is being closely monitored and the amount of time available for chairing case conferences has been increased. Efforts to family find are being targeted at those who have waited longest.
