Please state the ground(s) for review (please read guidance note 1) Jeen Cash & carry is currently authorised to supply alcohol for consumption OFF of the premises. The venue is privileged to hold a 24 hour premises licence, one of a handful in the Borough. Because of this it has numerous conditions attached;

1. CCTV shall be installed and maintained in a working condition.

2. All CCTV recordings shall be kept for 31 days and shall be made available to police and licensing officers if requested.

3. A copy of the premises licence summary including the hours which licensable activities are permitted shall be visible from the outside of each entrance to the premises.

4. A "Challenge 21" policy shall be adopted and adhered to.

5. A sign stating "No proof of age - No sale" shall be displayed at the point of sale.

6. "Raid Control" crime prevention measures shall be installed and all staff given suitable training.

7. No high strength beers, lagers or ciders above 5.5% ABV shall be stocked.

8. A personal licence holder shall be present on the premises and supervise the sale of alcohol throughout the permitted hours for the sale of alcohol. Members of staff who have formally been given authority should be fluent in English in order to properly conduct the sale of alcohol and more importantly to refuse the sale if so required.

The premises licence holder is Mr Kannan Thangarasa. The designated premises supervisor is a relative Mrs Renuka Thushyanthan. She is also the designated premises supervisor of another premise situated in the vicinity of this shop. Mrs Renuka Thushyanthan and her husband Mr Thushyantham Alakaratnam have been involved in the operation of this shop since 2008.

Jeen Cash & carry is failing to promote three of the licensing objectives, namely the prevention of crime and disorder, public safety and the prevention of public nuisance.

Police have no faith in the ability or willingness of the management to operate the premises responsibly, they ignore Police advise/guidance and therefore wish to bring the matter before the sub-committee for consideration. Police are primarily concerned with insufficient supervision, disregard of licensing

legislation and sales of prohibited items. The operation of this premises 24 hours daily is adding to the unacceptable number of street drinkers in the vicinity at all hours of the day and night. Police have witnessed much of this and in addition have received complaints from other authorities. Police seek the removal of the DPS who struggles to supervise this 24 hour venue sufficiently whilst supervising another premise and managing a young family. A reduction in authorised hours; sale of alcohol permitted from 0800 hours to 0200 hours daily. Police would request additional conditions be attached to the premises licence in relation to major football event days at Wembley Stadium :

- No sales of beer or cider in glass containers to be undertaken during this period, remove glass bottles except wines and spirits from display.
- No more than four cans of beer or cider to be sold to an individual
- All persons buying alcohol, at any time, to be advised of the Street Drinking ban
- Stop selling alcohol 1 hour before the designated kick off time. Sales of alcohol can resume at the kick off time.

Police feel that these are wholly reasonable, proportionate and appropriate measure to be put in place to promote the licensing objectives. Police reserve the right to give evidence on any further incidents which may take place at, or in the vicinity of the premises, between the service of this application and the hearing and/or during the time allowed for any appeal proceedings.

6th April 2009

A meeting was held at Wembley police Station with Sergeant Adolphus, myself and Mr Thushyantham Alakaratnam the husband of the current DPS. At this time Mr Thushyantham Alakaratnam was the DPS for the shop and had held that position since April 2008. He was informed of the requirement for match days at Wembley Stadium, in particular I fully explained to him and despite poor English he fully understood the requirement to: Not to serve glass bottles of beer and cider only cans or plastic.

No more than four cans of beer or cider to be sold to an individual

All persons buying alcohol at any time to be advised of the street drinking ban.

To stop the sale of alcohol 1 hour before the scheduled kick off.

He was supplied with the latest stadium event list and a letter outlining the above.

Mr Thushyantham Alakaratnam agreed to all the voluntary conditions on major football events.

He was then asked what happened in Harrow, he became a bit uneasy and said that he had a very bad experience in Harrow and was let down by his staff. I told him that I did not want a repeat of that, PS Adolphus also informed him that Police had received information of him selling alcohol to children after school time. He totally denied this. He was informed that his premises would be under scrutiny in the near future, and to make sure he was complying with the conditions of his licence and the legislation. He confirmed that he was fully training his staff and that his CCTV at the premises was working correctly and retained images for at least 31 days, he stated that he would not be making any further mistakes as his livelihood and that of his 3 children depended on it.

25th September 2010

At 0020 hours PC McDonald visited the premises with PS Adolphus. The DPS at that time, Mr Piraba IYATHURAI was not present. Mr Thangarasa Kannan, dob 01-09-82 of 92 Walton Ave, Sth Harrow, HA2 8QX was managing the shop (current premises licence holder).

12th December 2014

2200 hours PC McDonald visited the shop, the DPS Mrs Renuka Thushyanthan was not present. One staff member Kumar Andrenou had very broken English stated she was relative of owner but limited grasp of questions regarding who the DPS was. This breaches condition 8 of the premises licence:

A personal licence holder shall be present on the premises and supervise the sale of alcohol throughout the permitted hours for the sale of alcohol. Members of staff who have formally been given authority should be fluent in English in order to properly conduct the sale of alcohol and more importantly to refuse the sale if so required.

There were bottles of Warki beer with an ABV of 6.5% and also foreign Guinness with an ABV of 7.5% on display in beer fridge. This breaches condition 7 of the premises licence: *No high strength beers, lagers or ciders above 5.5% ABV shall be stocked.*

13th December 2014

A warning letter delivered to the DPS with regard to the breaches identified on 12th December 2014.

22nd March 2015

PC McDonald and PC Whitcomb visited the premises at 1700 hours during a major football game at Wembley Stadium. The DPS was not present however her husband Mr Thushyantham Alakaratnam was managing the shop. He indicated that there is a silent partner involved in the shop at the present time, negotiating if the shop is a viable investment. Police identified at least five different brands of beer above 5.5% ABV. This breaches condition 7 of the premises licence:

No high strength beers, lagers or ciders above 5.5% ABV shall be stocked.

This was pointed out to Mr Thushyantham Alakaratnam and told to remove them from display immediately. He claimed they must have come in the cash and carry deliver by mistake. This is a very poor excuse. See photos attached.

All stock of glass bottled beers and ciders were also on display. This was breaching the voluntary agreement and jeopardizes the three highlighted licensing objectives.

26th March 2015

Formal Warning letter delivered to the DPS with regard to the breaches identified on 22nd March 2015.

19th April 2015

PC McDonald visited the shop at approximately 1200 hours during sell out football event, FA semi final finals. There was a large amount of football fans on the pavement in the vicinity drinking beer from glass bottles and a minor disturbance. Glass beer bottles is an unusual sight on football events due to the voluntary agreement. Jeen Cash & carry were once again displaying and selling glass bottles of beers and cider. This was very disappointing; however more worrying was the lack of English speaking, trained, knowledgeable staff. The DPS

was not present, neither was their a personal licence holder. This breaches condition 8 of the premises licence:

A personal licence holder shall be present on the premises and supervise the sale of alcohol throughout the permitted hours for the sale of alcohol. Members of staff who have formally been given authority should be fluent in English in order to properly conduct the sale of alcohol and more importantly to refuse the sale if so required

The two Asian male members of staff could not speak English, a customer was translating on their behalf. One of these males appeared to be disabled. These staff members should have been suitably supervised especially on that day with the added risk of football fans. There was no way these males could have challenged or prevented sales of alcohol. It became apparent the DPS was working at her other shop at 297 Harrow Road. I visited this shop to discover more football fans outside drinking beer from glass bottles, and crates full of glass bottled beer on display. I explained the two staff members in jeen cash & carry needed supervision urgently. Visits were made at the two other off licences in the vicinity and neither had glass bottles of beer or cider on display.

22nd April 2015

Formal warning letter written to the DPS with regard the events on 19th April 2015.

23rd April 2015

PC Lewis-Evans delivered the above letter by hand to the shop. The DPS was not present. PC Lewis-Evans spoke to her husband. PC Lewis-Evans saw three High Strength beers displayed for sale on the shelves, namely Zubra 6% ABV, Old Empire IPA Ale 5.7% ABV, and Desporados 5.9% ABV. This is breaching condition 7 of the premises licence:

No high strength beers, lagers or ciders above 5.5% ABV shall be stocked.

Meeting held at Brent Civic Centre with Licensing Police, Mrs Renuka Thushyanthan and Mr. Kannan Thangarasa. Police expressed their frustrations that over a four week period 3 visits were made to the shop and breaches where identified on all occasions. That the operators of the shop just appear to be ignoring warnings and advice and that the only way for them to realise the severity of their operation and the harmful impact it his having on the surrounding neighbourhood is to bring it to the attention of the sub-committee.

12th May 2015


PC Whitcomb visited the premises at 1245 hours. The DPS was not present, neither was their a personal licence holder. This breaches condition 8 of the premises licence:

A personal licence holder shall be present on the premises and supervise the sale of alcohol throughout the permitted hours for the sale of alcohol. Members of staff who have formally been given authority should be fluent in English in order to properly conduct the sale of alcohol and more importantly to refuse the sale if so required. There were two Asian males in the shop one claimed to be a helper and not a member of staff. The one that was staff spoke very limited English and was very nervous. Officers asked to view the CCTV cameras. Officers discovered it was not working in accordance with the authority of the premises licence. This breaches:

Condition 1 CCTV shall be installed and maintained in a working condition.

Condition 2 All CCTV recordings shall be kept for 31 days and shall be made available to police and licensing officers if requested.2 of the premises licence

There was no sign at the point of sale regarding proof of age, this breaches condition 5 A sign stating "No proof of age - No sale" shall be displayed at the point of sale.

13th May 2015

On TUESDAY 12th May 2015, I was on duty in plain clothes with PC 368QK Sullivan. PC Sullivan and I are both police officers working within Brent borough police licensing unit. At around 12:45pm we attended JEEN CASH & CARRY, 306 HARROW ROAD, WEMBLEY, HA9 6LL, in order to carry out a licensing inspection. The premise is licensed for the sale of alcohol by retail twenty four hours a day, seven days a week. Upon arrival, the shop was open and alcohol on sale. I noticed two Asian males stood behind the shop counter. Both appeared to be very nervous as PC Sullivan and I identified ourselves as police officers, by producing our warrant cards. I explained that we were at the shop to carrying out a licensing inspection. The first male, who I would describe as the younger of the two, spoke very limited English. He gave me his details as Mr. Asadullah SABIR dob 01/01/1984 of 8c WILL CRESCENT, WEMBLEY, HA9. I suspect that these details are false, as there is no Will crescent in Wembley. The second male behind the counter could speak no English at all. However he kept saying to me, 'Helper, helper'. I took this to mean that he was not a member of staff and just helping out. He did not give me his personal details. Neither of these men was able to produce a personal licence to me. This breaches condition eight (8) of the premises licence, which states that a personal licence holder must be present on the premises at all times throughout the sale of alcohol. A few minutes later, a female who I know as the shop's DPS arrived. Her name is Ms. Renuka THUSHYANTHAN. I requested to see her personal licence, but she was unable to produce one. She stated that she believed it was at home. Both Part A and part B of her premises licence was displayed on the wall behind the counter. I asked to inspect these documents, which she handed over. Soon after this, the premises licence holder, Mr. Kannan THANGARAS attended the shop. He produced his personal licence to me upon my request. He had failed to inform the local authority of a change of address, as the address on

the licence was different to his current home address. I pointed this out to him. With regard to his two members of staff, he confirmed that neither currently holds a personal licences. Mr KANNAN explained that Mr. SABIR was on a two day trial and that the older male was not a member of staff at all. He was unable to produce any paperwork with these two members of staff details written on. In fact, he claimed not to know the name of the younger male at all! I asked to see his statement of authority. He was unable to produce one, which breaches mandatory condition lettered (b) which states that every supply of alcohol must be either made or authorised by a holder of a personal licence. PC SULLIVAN and I inspected their alcohol stock and this was satisfactory. I then asked Ms. THUSHYANTHAN to show me that her CCTV system operates correctly. The CCTV was displaying on an LCD screen by the main entrance. However, due to a defective mouse and no other way to operate the hard drive, she was unable play back any CCTV footage at all. This breaches condition one (1) and two (2) of their premises licence, which states that the CCTV system must be in a working condition and should be made available to police on request. On further inspection I noticed that there was no sign reading, 'No proof of age - No sale' on display at the point of sale. This breaches condition number five (5) of their premises licence which stipulates that such a sign must be displayed. This concluded our visit, which I documented and then left the shop.

I am writing this letter in response to my visit to **Jeen Cash & Carry** on Sunday 22nd March 2015, when the venue was open to the public and alcohol was being sold. I attended to carry out a licensing visit.

Working together for a safer London

During my visit I inspected your alcohol stock, which was for sale on the shop floor. I found Oranjeboom Premium (8.5% ABV), Perla (6.0% ABV), Zubr (6.0% ABV), Tatra Mocne (7.0% ABV), Scrumpy Jack (6.0% ABV) and Okocim (7.0% ABV). **This breaches condition seven** (7) of your premises licence. 'No high strength beers, lagers and ciders above 5.5% ABV shall be stocked.

I must point out that the above breach amounst to an **offence** under **s.136 Licensing Act 2003,** namely carrying on unauthorised licensable activity. Upon conviction, this offence is punishable by up to six (6) months imprisonment and/or a fine of £20,000 or both.

However, I have taken into account that your staff were quick to rectify this issue and removed all products which breached your authority. As such, and on this occasion, please accept this letter as a formal 'warning'.

Annexe 1 - Mandatory Conditions

(a) No supply of alcohol may be made at a time when no designated premises supervisor has been specified in the licence or at a time when the designated premises supervisor does not hold a personal licence or his or her licence has been suspended.

(b) Every supply of alcohol under the premises licence must be made or authorised by a person who holds a personal licence.

(c) All persons present on the premises who are required to carry out a security activity must be licensed by the Security Industry Authority.

(d) The responsible person shall take all reasonable steps to ensure that staff on relevant premises do not carry out, arrange or participate in any irresponsible promotions in relation to the premises.

(e) The responsible person shall ensure that no alcohol is dispensed directly by one person into the mouth of another (other than where that other person is unable to drink without assistance by reason of a disability).

(f) The responsible person shall ensure that free tap water is provided on request to customers where it is reasonably available.

- gin, rum, vodka or whisky: 25ml or 35ml; and
- still wine in a glass: 125ml; and

(2) customers are made aware of the availability of these measures.

Members of staff who have formally been given authority should be fluent in English in order to properly conduct the sale of alcohol and more importantly to refuse the sale if so required.




