I am a Police Constable of 22 years experience, the last 17 years I have worked on the London Borough of Brent since 2005 I have been attached to the licensing unit for the borough. I have been authorised via a delegated
authority to represent the Borough Commander for the London Borough of Brent and for the Commissioner of the
Metropolitan Police Service to act on licensing matters.
This statement is in addition to my previous attached to the premises licence review application dated 15th March 2012.
On Friday 11th May 2012 I was on duty in plain clothes in Kilburn High Road, NW6. At 0655 hours I was standing
on the junction with Gascony Avenue which is opposite 203 Kilburn High Road. I saw the shop at 203 was open
to the public, the front door was wide open, and an illuminated open sign in the window. There was no serving
hatch visible or in use. I then continued investigating other licensing matters but returned to 203 on the same day
at 0715 hours. The premises licence authorises sale of alcohol between 0800 - 0400 hours daily. At 0715 hours
I entered the shop. I was the only customer and there was two Asian male members of staff at the serving
counter. One was approximately in his 20's or 30's and the other male was wearing a baseball cap, light skinned
with a large nose over 50 years. I did not see the designated premises supervisor Mr Ajaz Ali.
Firstly I browsed around the shop, then I picked up a bottle of White Ace Cider 7.5% ABV advertised at £1.59 that
was exposed for sale, I also chose a soft drink priced at 89p. I went to the serving counter and placed both
bottles next to the till. The male with the baseball cap said 'hello' and rung in the amount of the two drinks. I paid

for the drinks and received change. The male with the baseball cap smiled broadly at me, I placed both bottles of drink in to my handbag and walked out of the shop. Neither member of staff refused the sale of alcohol, challenged me or explained they could not sell alcohol before 8AM. I exhibit the (1) one litre bottle of White Ace Cider that I purchased as NM/1 bag seal reference MPSC35964582.

Next to the shop is an old bingo hall with sheltered steps. Curled up sleeping on these steps was a male wearing dirty blue jeans and a blanket over his head. Next to him was a bottle of White ace cheap high strength Cider like that I had just purchased.

My visit is further evidence of how this shop is ill managed, lacks supervision and does not promote the licensing objectives. Carrying on licensable activities (sale of alcohol) from the premises without authority is an offence under section 136 of the Licensing Act 2003. Exposing alcohol for unauthorised sale is an offence under section 137 of the Licensing Act 2003. Keeping alcohol on the premises for unauthorised sale is an offence under section 138 Licensing Act 2003.

Once again I have not seen Mr Ali working at the shop, this is in addition to the two independent visits made by Lavine Miller-Johnson Brent council Licensing enforcement officer on 16th March 12 and 31st January 12 when Mr Ali was not present.

I have sent a letter in the post today to Mr Ali at his home address and the shop address requesting a copy of the CCTV footage that will show the above offences.
