7. Detail of Project

The programme seeks to provide an holistic service of structured confidence and motivation training to BME families who have multiple barriers to utilising the many facilities available in the borough; to give them the tools to take full responsibility and control of their lives.

All clients will be entered into a structured package of training which will be delivered on a rolling programme. Any health related problems identified will result in referrals made to specialised services for additional support.

In addition the following activities will be provided:

- a) A drop-in will be operated once a week from 10.00am 3.00pm by a trained health advicer to support beneficiaries. Where necessary, provision will be made for beneficiaries who want to use the drop-in service outside of these hours.
- b) The project will also provide 6 session of interactive shared group learning activities every quarter. People will be encouraged to understand their health issues and learn how to manage/combat any health related issues with the assistance of other interested parties in the area of health, housing and wellbeing.
- c) Monthly group discussion sessions targeted at fathers will be provided to offer training programmes that incorporates Stress and Depression management, Stop smoking services, Drug and alcohol related problems, TB, sexual health, Healthy Eating on a budget, through the satellite outreach service reaching 10 identified locations in Brent.
- d) Individual clients will be offered opportunity to make active contribution into the society in which they live by engaging them into volunteering opportunities through our links with Brent Active Citizens.

The end result of this programme will be to ensure better health conditions and improved access to the use of available relevant health, and housing services in the borough. The project also works to alleviate self stigmatised understanding of health conditions enabling individuals to articulate and work through their issues.

7. Detail of Project

Working Borough-wide, BPA offers access to group sessions, discussions, voluntary work and training, with a view to part and full-time employment, as well as raising awareness of the many different cultural groups and organisations in the Borough, and encouraging greater understanding and participation in the life of the Borough.

Easily accessible premises offering crèche facilities, parenting support, disabled access, internet access and highly trained staff. Provision of family numeracy and literacy projects which have assisted parents, particularly those who have English as a second language, in coming to terms with the school curriculum, at all levels, in order to be able to support and assist their children. There is also a strong interest in improving the local canal environment, which runs centrally through the Borough, and will use BPA's narrow boat to introduce groups of local people to this untapped resource.

7. Detail of Project

The project seeks to identify 37 families/yr (average 3 per month) experiencing family breakdown but who do not currently qualify for funding and provide mediation. The areas the organisation would work in include Stonebridge, Round Wood and Church End. On average mediation would consist of an initial interview with each person followed by 3 joint mediation sessions. Evaluation of results will enable an understanding of whether the expected outcomes and changes have occurred. The aim is to enable a more harmonious and stable life for the children and families – leading to improved attendance and/or achievement at school, emotional strength and behaviour, reduce the need for costly interventions from social services and/or the school, lowering the risk of offending and reducing health costs.

An overview of the process:

Key factors are trust in CPS and management of families expectations

Access and movement through the provision

- 1. After referral or contact from the potential client they will be phoned, this initial interaction is:
 - a. very much a listening exercise
 - b. scoping the issues
 - c. arranging a first meeting at the office or at their home as appropriate
- 2. The first meeting will:
 - a. Help the client identify their options
 - b. Define the service
 - c. Identify support links
 - d. Triage the problem a range of possibilities result.
- 3. Examples of possible first meeting outcomes are:
 - a. Contact details of the other person they want to invite to the process are given and if they agree – this goes straight to mediation.
 - b. Although the other partner can be contacted the person is so confused they are not able to go into mediation yet - so they access counselling/coaching to build their resilience and understanding of their options - identifying the possible results for

- their choices including their legal position time taken is on an individual needs basis 1 sessions of one hour.
- c. The client does not know where the partner is so we will help them to move on working with the extended family to ensure consistent understanding and support to stabilise the situation for the parent and the children; relying on benefits they will need to consider getting into employment.
- d. The other partner is so hostile it will be a long process many others may be involved; we will work with each person, we broker small do-able steps to create better goodwill.

Mediation process

The parties, not the mediator, will negotiate the terms of the agreements. Mediation can be round table face to face or shuttle where they sit in separate rooms.

Measurable Outcomes resulting from improved collaboration.

Outcomes are monitored via the successful production of:

- United parenting voice agreement
- Distance travelled in terms of conflict level and behavioural changes for parents and children
- o improvements in school performance or health for the children
- Additional outcomes on a case by case basis e.g. father seeking employment

7. Detail of Project

The main aim of the project is to tackle low attainment levels of residents in South Kilburn by offering flexible accredited training which would lead to nationally recognised qualifications. Most of the project's activities will take place outside of school of hours on weekday evenings and on school holidays. This will divert young people away from hanging around on the streets, where the chances of them being involved in antisocial behaviour are higher. A family learning course will engage and teach parents to interact better with their children. CCA will work with the Granville Children's Centre to extend their provisions and target young single parents.

- 1. Filmmaking: A new weekly evening filmmaking course will offer 15 places on a year-long programme. It will include scripting and shooting a film about issues pertinent to young people and a short advice film for young mothers. These films are to be shown in community venues and schools and CCA's website. Young people will be guided by an experienced film facilitator and will learn to monitor and evaluate a project, compile a report, gain customer feedback, budgeting, and structure timetables and meet deadlines, time management, deliver consultation forums and match people to roles according to their skills set. Over 200 young people will indirectly benefit from watching the films.
- 2. Performing Arts: The project will employ a drama facilitator to deliver a weekly evening performing arts class which meet the developmental needs of local young people. 25 participants will engage in a number of innovative interpersonal role play activities which allow them to grasp the wider consequences of their actions and build understanding of how others may see them. Participating in drama workshops will help reduce the risk of antisocial behavior by having young people engaged in more constructive activities. A short forum theatre piece will be devised and performed in community venues and schools which will be viewed by at least 150 people.
- 3. Mentoring: A monthly one-to-one and group mentoring service will offer residents an opportunity to work closely with professionals from a wide range of industries. They will be offered help in areas including, CV writing, interview skills, application forms, job searching or further training. They may also be referred to the relevant people (housing / outreach etc.) according to their needs.
- 4. Mini TV studio: CCA developed a disused radio studio in Kilburn into a multiuse mini filming and recording studio. This space supports our filmmaking projects and will provide training in multimedia and publishing to give 10 participants a creative platform to have their voices heard. Its benefits will also extend to the wider community who will gain training in photography, editing and music from artists using the space.

- 5. Youth Leadership: An accredited youth leadership programme will offer 10 volunteers a year training to support the delivery of the project. The experience and qualifications gained will enhance the skills-set of our young leaders and help them overcome barriers to employment and further education or training.
- 6. Family Learning: All parents want their children to do well and succeed in life. The project intends to do this by improving access to training and employment to improve the financial confidence of sixty 18-30 year olds tenants of social landlords in the target areas over a three year period. Year 1- St Raphael's (20), Year 2-Church End (20) and Year 3-Stonebridge (20). Targeting those who have been out of work for a long time and provide skills and work experience (via placement) to gain employment.

They will be trained on all aspects of the social housing sector by training the target group as:

- Future housing officers;
- Customer service officers;
- Tenant participation officers
- Officers working within the maintenance department.

This is with a view to supporting them into rewarding and sustainable employment which will provide a stepping-stone out of a life of poverty, crime and inequality. This will start in May 2013 for 12 weeks (training) and 8 weeks of work placement. This will be provided in each of the target areas of Brent over three years.

The project will start in May 2013 with each area group of 20 beneficiaries divided into two groups of 10 to be trained over fifteen weeks consecutively. This will consist of a theoretical training course that will last for a period of 12 weeks followed by work placement of 8 weeks within a Local Authority, Housing Association or Advice Centre setting.

It is expected that each year the following outcomes will be evident in at least 50% of the participants. Ultimately, the changes we would like to achieve through DEEP project are:

- 20 unemployed people potentially integrated back into society through work placement with a Local Authority or Housing Association for gainful employment experience by the end of the project.
- 20 disadvantaged and deprived BME people report reduction in social exclusion due to improvement in their self- confidence / self-esteem.
- Provide opportunity for 20 skilled or unskilled people to acquire new skills and qualifications to improve their life skills for job prospects through cross - training into Social Housing.
- 20 long-term unemployed people will be gainfully employed by the end of the project.
- 20 hard to reach people participate in lifelong learning via progression into further education i.e. acquisition of NVQ Level 3 Advice and Guidance.

7. Detail of Project

Working with schools – the project will form new partnerships with schools in Brent as well as build on existing relationships with schools to run weekly singing sessions in collaboration with school music departments. The main aims of these sessions will be to bring together young and older people, and expand both generations' knowledge of different songs from a vast array of cultures. These sessions will lead towards performances.

Monthly workshops with older people including those with dementia — workshops will be held in a variety of settings including residential and care homes, community settings, and Day Centres. These workshops will work with older people who have not sung for a very long time, or who have never sung much at all. The workshops will work slowly with people so that they may gain confidence in their abilities, enjoy the physical benefits of singing, take part in the social environment and learn something new while having fun. The benefit of singing for people with dementia is well researched and their musical memory often allows them to be very much 'in the moment' while singing songs from their pasts..

Fortnightly choir sessions for older people – these sessions will be held for the existing Elders Voice choir members and will be used to recruit new members. The sessions will concentrate on adding to the skills of the participants so that there is an element of progress and participants will be able to identify how much they have learnt. They will also be encouraged to run workshops in schools and day centres as the project progresses over the three years. New members will be encouraged to join the choir to add to the diversity of the group and to get members from throughout Brent. New songs from different cultures, languages and genres will be learned at the sessions, thus increasing members' cultural knowledge.

Performances will be held each year at schools and other community settings. This will give participants the opportunity to experience performing in front of an audience, sharing what they have been working on and experiencing the joy of achievement. This will also provide a good opportunity to raise the profile of the choir and attract new members. The project will publicise the choir by making a short video for YouTube and putting it on our website.

How it will be run, frequency of activity and number of residents benefiting:

This project will deliver a nature conservation, recycling and climate change educational programme over three years in collaboration with local schools and the wider community. One school will support/adopt one park per year.

The programme includes:

1. Nature conservation activities: held in 3 parks (Brent River Park, Gladstone and Roundwood). This will provide young people with opportunities to take part in conserving their local environment while learning new skills and building up their confidence and self esteem.

The environmental workshops will be linked to the school curriculum and the workshops will increase knowledge concerning:
