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Appendix 1: Summary of VSIF Funded Projects - 2012 - 2016

The Voluntary Sector Initiative Fund (VSIF) was created from the previous Main Programme Grant & Advice budgets and was the result of extensive public consultation with voluntary sector organisations. The Voluntary Sector Initiative Fund (VSIF) has been allocated into four funding streams:

- 1) Local Grants
- 2) Infrastructure Support CVS funding
- 3) Advice and Guidance Contracts
- 4) London Council's Grant

This report summarised the projects funded under the Local Grants funding stream. The Local Grants were allocated to grant-funded Borough Plan aligned projects

There were 2 VSIF grants programmes running as follows, one being completed in March 2015 and another running until March 2016.

VSIF Local Grants 2012-2015

This first round of Local Grants for the financial year 2012-13 was allocated to be used for projects which ran for 2 years and 9 months and which were aligned to the Borough Plan priorities excluding crime and regeneration. These are referred to as VSIF Local Grants 2012-15 and were approved by the Executive in January 2012. A budget allocation of £661,147 was allocated between 12 projects. The bids invited were around the following themes

- Theme1: Supporting children and Families and enabling young people to thrive
- · Theme 2: Addressing Health and Well Being
- Theme 3: Protecting our environment and enhancing our cultural offer

Crime and regeneration theme funded projects ran until March 2013 and this is why these priorities were not included this round.

The council received 51 bids from 49 organisations seeking a total of £3,017,367 Of the 49 organisations which applied, 23 were new to council grant funding or returning after a number of years. For a number of new organisations which applied in this round there was further development required to meet the funding criteria.

VSIF Local Grants 2013-2016

A 3-year funding stream which commenced in the financial year 2013-14 for projects aligned to the range of borough plan priorities (community safety; regenerating the borough; supporting children & families; addressing health & wellbeing and protecting the environment). These grants which offered additional themes are referred to VSIF

Local Grants 2013-16. These were approved by the Executive in February 2013 with a total budget allocation was £1,114,701 of which £951,363 was allocated over a period of three years to 14 projects meeting the grant criteria.

The remaining budget was allocated to small grants from 2013-2016. The small grants are for a period of one year up to a maximum of £10,000. Small grants funding was awarded to local organisations to assist with on-off projects, events, equipment that will benefit residents in the borough.

The council received 65 bids from 65 organisations seeking a total of £3,017,367 over a three-year period. Of the 65 organisations which applied, 23 were new to council grant funding or returning after a number of years. For a number of new organisations which applied in this round there was further development required to meet the funding criteria

The council is working with CVS Brent to ensure continued support for organisations bidding for funding from the council and other funders and look at the range of other ways in which local groups can have more success in securing other funding for local projects in Brent

Introduction

This Impact Assessment considers the proposal to make amendments to the Voluntary Sector Initiative Fund – Local Grants, which was approved previously from 2012 – 2015.

The proposal reasserts the underlying principles for grant funding whilst taking into account the reduced budget that is available to provide large grants and the new priorities of the borough as set out in the Borough Plan 2015 – 2019.

The main amendments to the new grants programme are:

- Alignment of the priorities of the grant programme to the new priorities of the Borough Plan 2015 – 2019;
- A decrease of the total annual amount of funding available of £168k;
- A change in the term of grant funding from 3 years to 2 years; and
- An introduction of a grant condition of paying all staff funded through the grant the London Living Wage.

Impact Assessment Data

What effects could your policy have on different equality groups and on cohesion and good relations?

The amendments to the grant programme will align the proprieties of the grant programme to those set out in the new Borough Plan 2015-16: better locally; better place and better lives. This will require them to be fully inclusive of all equality groups in the borough and have a positive impact on cohesion in the borough overall.

There will a general reduction in funding of £168k, although as this is an across the board reduction in spending, it should not impact any one protected group disproportionally more than any of the others should it do so at all. There is also no reason to believe that a change in grant term from three to two years as set out in the introduction should raise any equalities concerns.

The introduction of the London Living Wage for paid staff will also have positive equalities outcomes insofar as it may narrow the income gap between those equality groups in the borough who often do not earn as much as the mainstream.

Any possible adverse impacts across these characteristics will likely become more apparent in the current fiscal climate of reduced public expenditure and the subsequent £168k change in grant spending. Infrastructure spending for Brent CVS will be maintained and is intended to support the growth and maintenance of a robust voluntary sector in Brent. This will have positive equalities outcomes for the borough as a whole.

Summary of research and/or engagement activities

Could any of the impacts of the advice and guidance review be unlawful under the Equality Act 2010?

What actions will we take to enhance the positive potential impacts that have been identified?

Ensure that all equalities groups are considered when awarding grant funding so that any one group does not benefit disproportionally more than others. However, due to the cumulative and disproportionate impact of budget cuts on some protected groups, there may be a need for positive action towards those groups when awarding grant funding. This will be considered against each protected groups' level of need in the context of budget cuts. In addition to this, infrastructure spending will remain in place to support the growth and maintenance of a thriving voluntary sector in the borough serving all equality groups.

What actions will be taken to remove any potential negative impacts that have been identified?

In allocating grants, consideration will be given to ensure that the widest range of services and activities are funded within the budget limits, taking into consideration the communities and needs in Brent. This will ensure that the grant funding programme as a whole is fully inclusive of all groups protected by the Equality Act.

Please explain how any remaining negative impacts can be justified?

The fiscal constraints imposed upon the borough by central government set out in the Comprehensive Spending Review mean that we have no choice but to reduce the budget for the grants programme. Under the 2012-15 arrangement, some equality groups benefitted disproportionately more than others for example, disabled, BAME and female residents, therefore a general reduction in spending may impact these groups disproportionally. Under the new arrangement, consideration will be given to every group when awarding funding to ensure that the program is fully inclusive of all groups protected by the Equality Act. However, the disproportionate impact of budget cuts on certain groups in the borough may necessitate a higher level of grant funding for those groups. This will be considered when awarding grant funding and will help to mitigate the potential negative effects outlined above.
