PROTECTIVE MARKING

I am giving this certificate because I am of the opinion that other procedures under the Licensing Act 2003 are inappropriate in this case because:

The premises has a long track record of both crime and disorder most recently on the 29/01/2017 at about 02.40 hours, police were alerted to a large disturbance outside the venue by a Brent Council CCTV operator, from viewing the councils CCTV a large group of male can be seen fighting after it appears people are ejected from the club, there are between 30 to 40 people involved, fighting amonst themselves and with door supervisors, barriers are seen being used as weapons, this continues into the road where people return waving belts and wrapping them around their knuckles, the fight then starts again in the middle of the road and continues until police arrive and arrest three of the males for an Affray.

Further disorder was captured by the Brent Council CCTV operator at 04:48 again large groups of male are seen fighting between themselves, one group are seen being chased down the road in their vehicle, only for them to reverse into the chasing crowd narrowly missing one male who just manages runs out of the way, the fighting continues until 05:08 with no sign of any SIA trying to stop the males from fighting.

On Tuesday 27th December 2016 at around 2.20am police were called ouside the venue following reports of a large fight involving bottles as weapons. Although the incident had concluded upon police arrival, a review of council CCTV, shows some of the incident, where a door supervisor can be seen on the ground injured. Shortly after this another door supervisor can be seen in possession of what appears to be a friction lock baton, an offensive weapon, which he can be seen brandishing towards a group of males who have belts wrapped around their hands. Later at around 3.20am hours, police were again called back to the venue. On this occaision one male was arrested. As they arrested this man, officers became under attack by others in the group and a police officer was assaulted in the disorder.

The Premises has previously received a warning letter and an action plan. These were pimarily around breaches of the premises licence in particular around CCTV failures.

A standard review was submitted on the 21st January 2017 after no sign of any positive changes were seen. As a result of these incidents, police lost faith in the management. Police believe that the immediate suspension of the premises licence is necessary to prevent any further crime and disorder.

This is deemed an appropriate and proportiante measure in view of the above evidence and to reduce any further threat to the public's safety and the prevention of crime and disorder.
