1.0 Purpose of the Report

1.1 This report updates members on the committee's work programme for 2018/19 and captures scrutiny activity which has taken place outside of its meetings.

2.0 Recommendation(s)

- 2.1 Committee to discuss and note the contents of the report, including updates about scrutiny issues outside of the work programme.
- 2.2 Committee agrees the task group membership so far for the members' overview and scrutiny task group which will be set up to review childhood obesity.

3.0 Detail

3.1 Members of the Community and Wellbeing Scrutiny Committee discussed their work programme for 2018/19 last year, which is published as Appendix A. The programme sets out what items will be heard at committee and which items will be looked at as task groups. However, the assumption made was that it would

evolve according to the needs of the committee, and spare capacity would be left to look at issues as they arise.

- 3.2 For practical reasons it may be necessary to move items to be heard at a particular committee date. In addition, members and co-opted members can at any time suggest an item, which if agreed by the chair, would mean the work plan changes. One change is that the report on the safeguarding adult review for Adult B will now be discussed at committee in the new municipal year.
- 3.3 In addition, the scoping paper on childhood obesity will now go to committee in the next municipal year when members are expected to confirm the full scoping paper and terms of reference for the task group. The scoping paper will set out the overall objectives for the review, areas of interest, and how it will approach evidence gathering. It is proposed that members on the task group will be:

- 3.4 If the committee wishes to appoint any other members to the task group then this will have to be confirmed on 17 April or at the committee meeting in July.
- 3.5 The new municipal year and the next cycle of committee meetings will start from 1 May 2019. The committee has previously moved items from this year into the next municipal year to allow more time for discussion at the committee meetings. Members may want to consider now what other items they would like to discuss in the next municipal year. Members will need to be mindful that at Council on 25 February 2019, there was a change to the terms of reference for the Community and Wellbeing Scrutiny Committee which means that housing will be part of its remit from the next year. Members of the committee have said they want to carry over a number of reports including but not limited to dementia, and open spaces and physical activity, to the next municipal year.
- 3.6 An update on public health in the Air Quality Action Plan 2017-2022 has been done by the Regeneration and Environment department and is in appendix B.

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Appendix B: Update on Public Health Actions in Air Quality Action Plan 2017-2022

All measures outlined in the air quality action plan 2017-2022 aim to improve local air quality and the environment for all.

Action 6: Engage with local business to reduce local air pollution

The focus of the work in the last 12 months has been air quality action associated with engine idling at schools. As a result, work has just begun to draft proposals for reducing emissions from business in potential Low Emission Neighbourhoods.

Action 7: Promote air quality action days

The council signed up to the Greater London Authority's Idling Action Group, consisting of 17 boroughs, in 2017. This enabled us to deliver anti-idling projects at relatively low cost and by sharing campaign materials and the delivery of training to local volunteers, we were able to maximise our use of existing resources.

The council organised four community events with a launch of the programme in Wembley in June 2018, Wembley Central and Cricklewood in September 2018 and Harlesden in January 2019. Each campaign was used to target local drivers and provide on-the-spot advice about the law and their contribution to poor air quality. We trained officers to be able to issue fixed penalty notices for enforcement against drivers who do not comply with requests to stop. We have not issued any notices to date.

Additional idling action events were also planned for 27th February 2019 in Kilburn (in collaboration with the London Borough of Camden) and 3rd April 2019 in Neasden Town Centre.

Brent celebrated National Clean Air Day on the 21st June 2018 with an event to promote the council's anti-idling work and communicate the council's plans to tackle pollution.

The event was held in Wembley in collaboration with Global Action Plan, Idling Action London, Brent Friends of the Earth and Clean Air for Brent (CAfB), a local community group. MP Smarter Travel, Dr Bike and Source London also participated and were on hand to field specific queries about cleaner transport, local cycling initiatives and options for electric vehicle charging. Council officers and volunteers engaged with drivers as well as with parents at four Wembley primary schools. Feedback from local residents and children, councillors, MPs and London Assembly members who attended was positive.

Brent celebrated Car Free Day on the 22nd September 2018, supported by local volunteers from various groups including Friends of the Earth, London Cycling Campaign, Play London and Harlesden Neighbourhood Forum. The aim of the day was to promote healthier car free travel alternatives including cycling and walking. It provided an opportunity for the community to host local events in streets that are closed to traffic.

Action 8: Ensure schools join the school travel planning programme

All Brent schools have travel plans and we are currently working with those with existing travel plans to achieve higher levels of compliance, attain STARS accreditation or maintain existing gold accreditation in the same scheme. In Brent 50 schools and 20 nurseries have an active travel plan promoting sustainable and safe ways of travelling; 40% of schools with existing travel plans have attained a higher level of compliance.

School Travel Planning is part of a wider programme to engage with schools (teachers, parents and children) to tackle local air pollution. This programme includes further engagement via school assemblies, improved and increased signage and provision of information about idling engines, audits of schools to identify measures they could employ and additional local air quality monitoring around schools to determine which schools should be our highest priority for future interventions.
