The bid seeks a revenue grant of £49.950.00 over 2 years and nine months from Jul1st 2012 until 31<sup>st</sup> March 2015 from the Voluntary Sector Initiative Fund Themed Grant Stream.

The organisation does not meet the financial criteria.

CCA sets out other sources of funding which will support the project. The level of funding sought, the project outlined and the proposed number of beneficiaries appears to be deliverable although the proposed budget for the first nine months should be adjusted to be a percentage of that sought for the following two full years.

CCA has a policy setting out its commitment to equal opportunities. Equality data about present provision by the organisation suggests that young people from black, whit and mixed ethnic backgrounds would benefit with an even split between males and females.

# 14. Internal Consultation

The assessment of the proposed project highlighted as positive response to the evidence of need and associated structured response to outcomes for young people alongside the proposed exit strategy.

## 15. Officers Assessment

CCA has been operating for eight years as a registered charity and company limited by guarantee. They provide services in arts and drama. The Council funds this organisation to provide services that improve opportunities and promote safe and strong communities in Brent.

The proposed project aligns with the Borough Plan priorities but does not meet all of the financial criteria. In assessing the range of projects the bid was not as strong as others.

In view of the combined assessment, officers are not satisfied that the project has met the criteria for funding.

Equality data about present provision by the organisation suggest that more females than males would benefit wit a larger group of 15-44 year olds and a smaller group of 60 -75 benefiting. The organisation anticipates people from a rage of ethnic and faith backgrounds benefiting.

## 14. Internal Consultation

Departments already working with this organisation gave a favourable response about their experience, but raised questions about the package of activities within the proposed project.

## 15. Officers Assessment

The Council hires out premises from this organisation on occasion. The organisation has provided 2 independent references and officers have worked successfully on some projects in the past.

The proposed project seeks to align with several Borough Plan priorities at once and not all of the financial criteria are met. The range of activities is quite broad and does not lend itself to a single project and the evidence of need and alignment to statutory provision could be developed further.

In view of the combined assessment, officers are not satisfied that this project has met the criteria for funding to support their proposed project on this occasion.
