The applicant has given thought to the potential impact of the grant of this application on the four licensing objectives and, having regarding to the locality, considers that the following conditions are appropriate.

b) The prevention of crime and disorder

- 1. The premises shall maintain a CCTV system which gives coverage of all entry and exit points. The system shall continually record whilst the premises are open and conducting licensable activities. All recordings shall be stored for a minimum period of 28 days and shall be capable of being easily downloaded. Recordings shall be made available upon the receipt of a request by an authorised Officer of the Police or the Local Authority.
- 2. There shall be "CCTV in Operation" signs prominently displayed at the premises.
- 3. An incident log (whether kept in a written or electronic form) shall be retained at the premises and made available to an authorised Officer of the Police or the Local Authority.
- 4. The premises shall operate a proof of age scheme, such as a Challenge 25, whereby the only forms of acceptable identification shall be either a photographic driving licence, a valid passport, military identification or any other recognised form of photographic identification incorporating the PASS logo, or any other form of identification from time to time approved by the secretary of the state.
- 5. The premises will be fitted with a burglar alarm system
- 6. The premises will be fitted with a panic button system for staff to utilise in the case of an emergency.

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The premises licence holder shall ensure that the appropriate fire safety, and health and safety regulations are applied at the premises.

A complaints procedure will be maintained, details of which will be made available in store and upon request.

e) The protection of children from harm

- 1. All staff will receive comprehensive training in relation to age restricted products and in particular the sale of alcohol. No member of staff will be permitted to sell age restricted products until such time as they have successfully completed the aforementioned training.
- 2. An age till prompt system will be utilised at the premises in respect of age restricted products.
- 3. A refusals register (whether kept and written or electronic form) will be maintained at the premises and will be made available for inspection upon request by an authorised Officer of the Police or the Local Authority



Police representation to the Premises Licence application for 'Co-operative Group Food Ltd',174 Watford Road, Wembley, HA0 3HB.

I certify that I have considered the application shown above and I wish to make representations that the likely effect of the grant of the application is detrimental to the Council's Licensing Objectives for the reasons indicated below.

I am of the opinion that the risk to the Council's objectives can be mitigated by removing the requested variations or attaching conditions to the Licence as shown below.

If these conditions were accepted in full I would withdraw my representation.

An officer of the Metropolitan Police, in whose area the premises are situated, who is authorised for the purposes of exercising its statutory function as a 'Responsible Authority' under the Licensing Act 2003.

The application has been made for a premises licence under section 17 of the act.

The Police representations are primarily concerned with crime and disorder and protection of children.

The location of this shop is in a predominantly residential area with a primary school opposite.

Because of this Police request that sales of alcohol do not start until 0900 hours when the pedestrian traffic of young impressionable children has ceased. Between the hours of 0600 to 0900 hours Police request that either the alcohol is out of display behind lockable shutters or the area coned off and the electronic till system prevents alcohol sales taking place.

Police require the following points should be included in the operating schedule or added as conditions in annex 2 of the premises licence.

CCTV shall be installed to Home Office Guidance standards and maintained in a good working condition and recordings shall be kept for 31 days and shall be made available to police and authorised Officers from Brent Council upon request.

CCTV cameras shall be installed to cover the entrance of the premises.

The CCTV system shall be capable of obtaining clear facial recognition images and a clear head and shoulders image of every person entering or leaving the premises.

A copy of the premises licence summary including the hours which licensable activities are permitted shall be visible from the outside the entrance to the premises.

No high strength beers, lagers, and ciders above 6.0% ABV shall be stocked or sold.

A "Challenge 25" policy shall be adopted and adhered to.

A sign stating "No proof of age – No sale" shall be displayed at the point of sale.

A suitable intruder alarm complete with panic button shall be fitted and maintained.

Any staff directly involved in selling alcohol for retail to consumers, staff who provide training and all managers will undergo regular training of Licensing Act 2003 legislation. This will be documented and signed for by the DPS and the member of staff receiving the training. This training log shall be kept on the premises and made available for inspection by police and relevant authorities upon request.

An incident log shall be kept at the premises, and made available for Inspection on request to an authorised officer of Brent Council or the Police, which will record the following:
All crime reported to the venue
Any complaints received
Any faults in the CCTV system
Any refusal of the sale of alcohol
Any visit by a relevant authority or emergency service.

I certify that I have considered the application shown above and I wish to make a representation that the likely effect of the grant of the application is detrimental to the Licensing Objectives for the reasons indicated below.

An officer of the Licensing Authority, in whose area the premises are situated, who is authroised for the purposes of exercising its statutory function as a 'Responsible Authority' under the Licensing Act 2003.

The application has been made for a new premises licence under section 17 of the Act.

The Licensing Authority representations are primarily concerned with the four licensing objectives;

- the prevention of crime and disorder;
- public safety;
- the prevention of public nuisance; and
- the protection of children from harm.

Timings

The area in which this premises is positioned is in close proximity to a primary school. In the interest of protecting children from harm, I would request that the following hours be modified:-

Supply of Alcohol

Monday- Sunday 06.00hrs-23.00hrs

This should be amended to:-

Monday-Sunday 09.00hrs - 23.00hrs

Conditions to be added to the Premises Licence

1. A CCTV system shall be installed and maintained in a good working order at the premises.





- 2. CCTV cameras shall be installed to cover the entrance of the premises.
- 3. CCTV recordings shall be kept for 31 days and shall be made available to the police or an authorised officer of Brent Council upon request. The CCTV images shall be kept in an easily downloadable format
- 4. The CCTV system shall be capable of obtaining clear facial recognition images and a clear head and shoulders image of every person entering or leaving the premises.
- 5. The CCTV images shall be kept in an easily downloadable format.
- 6. An age verification scheme, such as Challenge 25, shall be implemented at the premises. The only forms of identification which shall be acceptable for the purposes of identification shall be a valid passport, UK driving licence, any form of identification incorporating the PASS logo, military identification or any other form of identification from time to time approved by the Secretary of State.
- 7. An age till prompt system shall be utilised at the premises in respect of age restricted products.
- 8. A summary of the premises licence including the hours which licensable activities are permitted shall be visible from the outside of each entrance to the premises.
- 9. Any staff directly involved in selling alcohol for retail to consumers and staff who provide training including managers shall undergo regular training of the Licensing Act 2003 legislation (at least every 12 months). The training shall be documented and signed off by the DPS and the member of staff receiving the training. This training log shall be kept centrally and made available for inspection by police and relevant authorities upon request.
- 10. Outside of the hours authorised for the sale of alcohol, all alcohol within the trading area is to be secured behind locked grills, locked screens or locked cabinet doors so as to prevent access to the alcohol by customers.
- 11. A sign stating "No proof of age No sale" shall be displayed at the point of sale.
- 12. An incident log shall be kept at the premises, and made available for inspection on request to an authorised officer of Brent Council or the Police, which will record the following:
 - a) All crime reported to the venue
 - b) Any complaints received in respect of the sale and consumption of alcohol
 - c) Any faults in the CCTV system
 - d) Any refusal of the sale of alcohol
 - e) Any visit by a relevant authority or emergency service.
- 13.No high strength beers, lagers, and ciders above 6.0% ABV shall be stocked.
- 14. A suitable intruder alarm complete with panic button shall be fitted and maintained.

In order for the Licensing Authority to withdraw this representation, it will be necessary for you to confirm that you accept the above conditions in writing.

This has been the case for many years now. In view of this, I cannot see the reason an additional retail outlet selling alcohol in the immediate area is needed. I have seen that an application for a New Premises Licence has been submitted for the sale of alcohol between 06:00-23:00 Monday-Sunday. My reasons for my objection are as follows;

I experience litter lying on and surrounding my property quite often, mostly being from alcoholic drink bottles and cans which I am left to clean up which is not only a risk to myself but is a great inconvenience and is unfair. If this licence was to be approved, this would only get worst. I want to be able to enjoy my front garden without having it abused by trash.

Also Despite that it is situated on a main road, it is still a residential neighbourhood where people have the right to enjoy their home without the disruption of noise and disruption. Should late night opening with the sale of alcohol be approved it will encourage late night noise, disruption and activities which will impact on the ability of the surrounding residents to enjoy decent sleep and impact their well-being. This is also the case in the early morning where the applicant seeks to open at 6 am. Again, we currently enjoy relative

quietness through to about 8am when work and school traffic builds. I feel I should have a reasonable expectation to a decent sleep in my home.

Licensing Act 2003 Objective - Public safety

Consideration of the proposed application gives incentive for public nuisance vice prevention of public nuisance as the hours proposed (specifically the antisocial licensing hours) do not benefit the amenity enjoyed by residents surrounding 164 Watford Road. All prior businesses at 164 Watford Road closed up between 6 and 7 pm and opened between 8 and 10 am. Those business hours had minimal impact on the neighbouring residents.

Licensing Act 2003 Objective - Prevention of Harm to Children

I have a young child who lives with me This recent application has raised huge concern to me of the safety of my child. If the front gardens of the residences surrounding 164 Watford Road become increasingly littered with broken bottles and sharp cans as a result of the sale of alcohol, especially the late night anti-social hours proposed, it will pose a direct threat to the health and safety of not only of my child but to children living in, or visiting the surrounding homes, and indeed to any residents and pets. This is cause for distress.

There are already many stores that have la icence to sell alcohol for residents in this area (East Lane, Shell Garage, Sudbury, North Wembley, John Lyon Roundabout). We are not in need for another licenced premise as this will only encourage disruptive behaviour to the area.

It is completely unclear why the very late night and very early morning sale of alcohol would be under consideration, when the partial outcome would be negative and detrimental to the immediate residential population. Residents should have a reasonable expectation that they can enjoy a nights sleep in their own homes and enjoy their gardens without litter deposition and also being able to feel safe.

Alcohol is already available for purchase at Premier Vineyards & Food at 10 Court Parade, East Lane, Wembley HA0 3HU - approximately 100 yards away from 164 Watford Road. This has been the case for many years now. In view of this, I cannot see the reason an additional retail outlet selling alcohol in the immediate area is needed.



The application to sell alcohol late night, if approved would bring this type of environment right to our doorsteps.

As this is predominantly a residential neighbourhood, it is reasonably quiet aside from road noise, which, once the bulk of the work traffic has diminished coincides with the time the majority of the

working population seeks to sleep. Should late night opening with the sale of alcohol be approved it will encourage late night noise, disruption and activities which will impact on the ability of the surrounding residents to enjoy decent sleep and impact their well-being. All prior businesses at 164 Watford Road closed up between 6 and 7 pm daily.

Licensing Act 2003 Objective - Prevention of Harm to Children

If the front gardens of the adjoining residences become littered with broken bottles and sharp cans, it will pose a direct threat to the health and safety of any children and indeed to any residents.

The applicant is applying to provide a further source alcohol within an area currently saturated with licensed premises (East Lane, Esso Garage, Sudbury, North Wembley, John Lyon Roundabout) all of which are already convenient to residents in the this area. Further saturation, especially with the proposed excessive opening hours is not in the interests of any of the residents surrounding the premises at 164 Watford Road. It is also the most aggressive opening plan proposed of all the Co-operative stores in the region. It is completely unclear why there would be a call for such opening hours in a residential area such as this.
