
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
- a) General all four licensing objectives (b, c, d, e): The licensee shall ensure that all staff are trained on relevant matters, including the conditions of the premises licence, age restricted products and [if they are ever left in charge of the shop] the operation of the CCTV system and how to deal with visits from authorised officers. The licencee shall keep written records of training and instructions given to each member of staff, detailing the areas covered to include the Licensing Objectives, identifying persons under 25, making a challenge, acceptable proof of age & checking it, making & recording a refusal, avoiding conflict & responsible alcohol retailing. Staff shall sign to confirm that they have received and understood the training. All staff who work at the till will be trained for their role on induction and be given refresher training every six months. The written training records kept for each staff member will be produced to police & authorised council officers on request.
- **b)** The prevention of crime and disorder: CCTV shall be installed, operated, and maintained, to function all times that the premises are open for licensable activities. This CCTV shall comply with the following criteria: (a) The licensee will ensure that

the system is checked every two weeks to ensure that the system is working properly and that the date and time are correct. (b) A record of these checks, showing the date and name of the person checking, will be kept and made available to the police or other authorised officer on request; (c) The Police will be informed if the system will not be operating for longer than one day of business for any reason; (d) One camera will show a close-up of the entrance to the premises, to capture a clear, full length image of anyone entering; (e) The system will provide full coverage of the interior of the premises and any exterior part of the premises accessible to the public; (f) The system will record in real time and recordings will be date and time stamped; (g) At all times during operating hours, there will be at least 1 member of staff on the premises who can operate the system sufficiently to allow Police or authorised Council officers to view footage on request. (h) Recordings will be kept for a minimum of 31 days and downloaded footage will be provided free of charge to the police or other authorised officers on request (subject to the Data Protection Act 1998) within 24 hours of any request. No beers lagers or cider above 6.5% ABV to be sold from the premises except for pre- agreed premium products. Copies of all invoices for the purchase of alcoholic products will be kept on-site and made available for inspection by the authorities for a period of at least 12 months. An incident log shall be kept at the premises, and made available on request to the police or an authorised officer, which will record: Notices will be prominently displayed by the entry/ exit. A) That CCTV is in use & a Challenge 25 proof of age policy is in operation; B) Advising customers of the provisions of the licensing act regarding underage & proxy sales; C) Of the permitted hours for licensable activities & the opening times of the premises; No alcoholic goods or tobacco products will ever be purchased or taken from sellers calling to the shop.

- c) Public safety: Staff will be trained to be alert to any potential danger to customers and react accordingly. If they are unable to quickly defuse the situation without risk to customer or staff, then they are instructed to call the police. All relevant fire procedures are in place for a premise of this size. All off sales will be sold in sealed containers.
- **d)** The prevention of public nuisance: Customers will be reminded by way of a notice at the entrance/ exit door to please leave the premises quietly and have consideration for the neighbouring properties. sufficient litter bins will be provided to allow the customers to deposit their waste/ rubbish in the correct manner.
- e) The protection of children from harm: Challenge 25 shall be operated as the proof of age policy and only a valid passport, photo driving licence, HM forces photographic iID card or proof of age card with the PASS logo or hologram on it may be accepted as proof of age. Prominent, clear and legible signage (in not less than 32 font bold) shall also be displayed at all entrances to the premises as well as at, at least one location behind any counter advertising the scheme. A notice will be displayed at the till either electronically or physically to remind staff to ask for identification. The premises shall at all times maintain and operate refusals recording system (either in book or electronic form) which shall be reviewed by the Designated Premises Supervisor at intervals of no less than 4 weeks and feedback given to staff as relevant. This refusals book will be kept at the premises and made available to officers of any responsible authority upon request.

# <u>Police Representations to a New Premises Licence application – Ghana Market, 138, Church Road, London, NW10 9NH.</u>

I acknowledge receipt of an application for a new Premises Licence under section 17 of the Licensing Act 2003, for Ghana Market, 138 Church Road, London, NW10 9NH.

On behalf of the Commissioner of Police of the Metropolis, I wish to make a representation, as police believe the following objectives will be undermined, namely the Prevention of Crime and Disorder and the Prevention of Public Nuisance.

An officer of the Metropolitan Police, in whose area the premises are situated, who is authorised for the purposes of exercising its statutory function as a 'Responsible Authority' under the Licensing Act 2003.

The venue sits on a parade of shops slightly off-set from Church Road (A407), which is a busy route for traffic throughout the day. The Church Road immediate surrounds itself is made up of a mixture of densely packed residential accommodation and some retail businesses. There are 4 existing off licences in close proximity to the newly proposed off licence. The socio-economic aspects of the area show it is made up of an ethnically diverse population, with a higher percentage of lower income residents comprising of semi-skilled, unskilled and those on state benefit (social grading figures taken from streetcheck.co.uk).

The area is somewhat rundown and has crime and disorder issues, including a lot of gang related violence in the area. There is a relatively high level of crime and disorder in the area, the vast majority relate to ASB, then violent offences against the person. In July 2021, for the NW10 9NH area, there were 81 reported cases of ASB, 48 cases of violence against the person and 21 drug offences from a total of 233 reported offences overall. These figures are usually higher. Whilst the area is not part of a designated Cumulative Impact Zone (or Area), it does experience its fair share of street drinking issues which can often lead or add to the issues of crime, disorder and public nuisance. Adding to the supply of alcohol off sales in the area is a definite concern given these existing issues, as well as there already being other 4 off licences close by.

Whilst some of the applicants proposed conditions are welcome, the issue of high strength beer, lager and cider is not addressed as well as I would hope. I would want amendments to the conditions relating to ABV strength of beer, lager and cider, as well as including a condition to tackle the sale of smaller bottles of spirits also associated with street drinking. Given the existing issues of the area, I would also ask for no exemptions to the beer, lager

and cider sales ABV condition, as the distinction and definition of a premium product can be somewhat open to interpretation. Many of the police proposed conditions are amendments to those suggested by the applicant. These amendments are more in line with creating a defined l'ndustry standard" condition that is not open to misinterpretation for the purposes of clarity and uniformity.

#### Personal Licence Holder

The sale of alcohol to drunken people and children is a common cause of concern to police and highlighted in the Governments Alcohol Harm Reduction Strategy. Those who sell alcohol should be fully aware of the legislation and issues around alcohol and should be fully trained to a national standard.

#### **Closed Circuit Television (CCTV)**

Good quality CCTV is essential as a deterrent for the prevention of crime and the detection of offenders. It allows for both covert and overt monitoring of the premises. With proper signage, this reassures both staff and clientele, that this is a safe environment where illegal activities are not tolerated. All cameras and recording equipment will be installed and maintained in accordance with Home Office Guidance and the manufacturer's instructions and will be fully operational when the premises are open to the public.

Notices shall be displayed at the entrance to the premises, and in prominent positions throughout the premises, advising that CCTV is in operation.

#### **Operating Hours to be displayed on Premises**

A notice displaying the opening hours, the type of licensing activity and licence conditions should be clearly displayed and visible to anyone <u>outside</u> the premises. This may be incorporated in the summary of the licence, which must be displayed, or take the form of a separate item. Likewise the name of the Designated Premises Supervisor (D.P.S.) should be similarly displayed. This will allow the Police and other responsible authorities to readily identify the licence details. Clearly displayed opening hours will also reduce any confusion for customers prior to entering the premises and possible conflict when the premises close/stop selling alcohol.

A Summary of the Premises Licence will be displayed at each public entrance to the premises.

# Police require the following points should be added as conditions on the premises licence as below.

- CCTV shall be installed to Home Office Guidance standards and maintained in a good working condition and recordings shall be kept for 31 days and shall be made available to police and authorised Officers from Brent Council upon request. This must comply with the Data Protection Act including signage.
- CCTV camera shall be installed to cover the entrance of the premises and further cameras installed to cover the full coverage of the interior of the premises accessible to the public.
- 3. The CCTV system shall display on any recordings the correct date and time of the recording.
- 4. The CCTV system shall be capable of obtaining clear facial recognition images and a clear head and shoulder image of every person entering or leaving the premises.
- 5. A member of staff trained in the use of the CCTV system shall be available at the premise at all times that the premises are open to the public.

- 6. The Licence holder/DPS/Manager shall inspect and test that the CCTV is operational and working correctly on a weekly basis. A signed and dated record of the CCTV examination and any findings shall be kept on the premises and made available to the police and authorised officers of the Local Authority on request.
- 7. A "Challenge 25" policy shall be adopted and adhered to at all times.
- 8. No high strength beers, lagers, and ciders above 6.0% ABV shall be stocked or sold.
- 9. No miniature bottles of wine or spirits in units less than 35cl shall be stocked or sold.
- 10. An incident log shall be kept at the premises, and made available for inspection on request to an authorised officer of Brent Council or the Police, which will record the following:
  - (a) all crimes reported to the venue
  - (b) all ejections of patrons
  - (c) any complaints received
  - (d) any incidents of disorder
  - (e) any faults in the CCTV system or searching equipment or scanning equipment
  - (f) any refusal of the sale of alcohol
  - (g) any visit by a relevant authority or emergency service.
- 11. A copy of the premises licence summary including the hours which licensable activities are permitted shall be visible from the outside of each entrance to the premises.
- 12. A suitable intruder alarm complete with panic button shall be fitted and maintained.
- 13. The following crime prevention measures shall be implemented:
  - A time delay safe with deposit slot and anti-fishing mechanisms must be used at the counter till area.
  - Regular robbery awareness and cash minimisation training shall be given to all staff.
- 14. All staff employed at the premises shall be fully trained in making sales of alcohol and in particular how to manage issues in relation to underage sales and dealing with intoxicated persons and street drinkers. The individual training shall be documented and made available to the police or officers authorised by the licensing authority upon reasonable request. This training should be conducted twice yearly.
- 15. No alcoholic goods or tobacco products will ever be purchased or taken from sellers calling to the shop.
- 16. The Challenge 25 shall be operated as the proof of age policy and only a valid passport, photo driving licence, HM forces photographic iID card or proof of age card with the PASS logo or hologram on it may be accepted as proof of age.
- 17. The till/s will utilise an electronic age verification check prompt for all sales of alcohol.
- 18. Copies of all invoices for the purchase of alcoholic products will be kept on-site and made available for inspection by the authorities for a period of at least 12 months.

Licensing Representation to the Initial Application for the Premises Licence at Ghana Market, 138 Church Road, London, NW10 9NH

I certify that I have considered the application shown above and I wish to make a representation that the likely effect of the grant of the application is detrimental to the Licensing Objectives for the reasons indicated below.

An officer of the Licensing Authority, in whose area the premises are situated, who is authroised for the purposes of exercising its statutory function as a 'Responsible Authority' under the Licensing Act 2003.

The application has been made for a new premises licence under section 17 of the Act.

The Licensing Authority representations are primarily concerned with the four licensing objectives;

- the prevention of crime and disorder;
- public safety;
- the prevention of public nuisance; and
- the protection of children from harm.

On Thursday 9<sup>th</sup> September 2021, I contacted the applicant, Miss Karen Lanquaye via telephone to ask a few questions regarding the application for a new premise licence.

The following questions were asked and recorded below:

Esther Chan (LA): When did you take over the business? Karen Languaye: I took over the business in November 2020. Esther Chan(LA): Are you the business rate payer?

Karen Lanquaye: My landlord pays the business rates as the shop is divided into two shops. I have a lease for five years.

Esther Chan (LA): When do you complete your personal licence course?

Karen Lanquaye: I completed the course months ago and waiting for the personal licence to come through.

Esther Chan (LA): Can you explain the four licensing objectives?

Karen Languaye: I can't remember.

Esther Chan (LA): Have you read the content on the application form?

Karen Lanquaye: Yes

Esther Chan (LA): What type of goods will you be selling? Karen Languaye: Afro Caribbean and Ghanaian products.

Esther Chan (LA): Why do you wish to sell alcohol

Karen Lanquaye: My business is struggling and I realised there is a demand for alcohol.

Esther Chan (LA): What do you know about the area?

Karen Lanquaye: I've in the area for three years. I don't mingle and haven't seen any problems. Divided community with a mix of Nigerians, Ghanaians and Somalis.

Esther Chan (LA): Are you aware of ASB issues in the area?

Karen Lanquaye: I have received a leaflet which explains the issues in the area but I have not personally come across any situations.

Esther Chan (LA): Can you describe the charateristic of a street drinker?

Karen Lanquaye: If they had abit to drink already.

Esther Chan (LA): How would you prevent the sale of alcohol to a street drinker?

Karen Languaye: I will convince them not to drink.

Esther Chan (LA): If you get the premise licence, explain the age verification policy that

you will adopt?

Karen Languaye: Check ID and not supply to under 18's.

Esther Chan (LA): How long will you keep CCTV footage?

Karen Lanquaye: Two weeks.

Esther Chan (LA): Will you sell alcohol (beers, ciders and lagars) over 6.5% abv?

Karen Languaye: No. I will sell Guinness and Stella.

Esther Chan (LA): Will this include the sale of single cans?

Karen Lanquaye: Yes I will sell single cans.

Esther Chan (LA): Who will train your staff?

Karen Languaye: I will.

Esther Chan (LA): How many staff will you employ?

#### Karen Lanquaye: Just my husband and I will be working as it is a small shop.

Street Drinking is a serious issue in many areas of the borough of Brent. This has contributed to the implementation of a Cumulative Impact Zone (CIZ) in the many parts of Harlesden and Willesden.

Whilst Church Road is not part of a CIZ, this area has become a hotspot for anti-social behaviour including street drinking. Due to various issues in the locality, this area has been included as a 'Day of Action' borough-wide enforcement campaign. The Localities Officer will provide their comments supported with crime stats as part of a supplementry document.

Following my telephone conversation with the applicant, I have strong concerns with their business plan for the premises and their level understanding in terms of promoting the licensing objectives.

Miss Lanquaye was not able to explain the licensing objectives despite completing a personal licence course only months ago and her response regarding the age verification policy was rather vague despite the application states she will adopt 'Challenge 25'.

Furthermore, she states that the CCTV footage will be kept for two weeks contrary to what is proposed on the application form. I am not convinced that Ms Lanquaye will be able to identify a street drinker who is intoxicated in order to challenge any potential issues in the premise, thus prevent street drinking.

There are a number of off licences within close proximity and in fact a few doors away, namely:

- Shop 4 You, 148 Church Road, NW10 9NH
- Quality Wines, 144 Church Road, NW10 9NH
- Morgan Cash & Carry, 120 Church Road, NW10, 9NG

Based on our conversation, it would appear that the applicant is selling alcohol products which is already available in the existing off licences in the locality and there are no niche products which suggest the premises is providing anything unique to the community.

The Licensing Authority feel that the applicant lacks knowledege as a licence holder and proposed DPS therefore I request that the application for a new Premise Licence at Ghana Market 138 Church Road, London, NW10 9NH be **refused**.
