1. Application

The application is for the review of a premises licence following a closure order. The licence is held by Gopal Gupta. The premises are known as Camelia Lounge, 36 Park Parade, NW10 4JE.

2. Grounds for Review

The grounds for review are the Prevention of Crime & Disorder and the Prevention of Public Nuisance.

The premises has been causing anti-social behaviour affecting local residents.

3. Relevant Representations

Representations have been received from the Police and Licensing Enforcement Officer.

4. Background

The Metropolitan Police have been granted a Closure Order under the Anti-Social Behaviour, Crime and Policing Act 2014 by Brent Magistrates Court for a period of 2 months ending on 28 October 2022. This review hearing is triggered automatically under the terms of section 167 of the Licensing Act 2003.

These premises are currently licensed for regulated entertainment and late night refreshment from 8pm until 2am Thursday to Saturday, and the sale of alcohol from 11am to 11pm Sunday to Wednesday and until 2am Thursday to Saturday. The premises are permitted to remain open from 8am to 11.30pm Monday to Wednesday, from 8am to 2.30am Thursday to Saturday and from 11am to 11.30pm Sunday.

There is currently no Designated Premises Supervisor at the premises.

- **5.** When hearing a review the Committee if satisfied that additional measures are required to satisfy the four licensing objectives they may:
 - Modify, remove or add conditions
 - Exclude one or more of the licensable activities
 - Remove the Designated Premises Supervisor

accessing this Premises is hereby PROHIBITED for any persons other than those who habitually reside in the Premises or the owner of the Premises, or those specified below, for a period of up to 24/48 hours starting at 1600 hours, on 18/08/2022 and ending at 1559 hours, on 19/08/2022 – subject to the following exceptions:

An application for a Closure Order will be made under Part 4, Chapter 3, section 80 of the Anti-Social Behaviour, Crime and Policing Act 2014 for the closure of the Premises specified above.

To be heard at WILLESDEN MAGISTRATES COURT Court on 19/08/2022 at 1000 hours, when evidence for the issue of a Closure Order will be considered.

I am the above named police officer attached to the Harlesden Town Centre Team based at Harlesden Police Station. This statement refers to CAMELIA LOUNGE, 36 PARK PARADE, NW10.

The Harlesden Town Centre Team is one of the 24 new town centre teams across The Metropolitan Police Service. They have been brought into tackle violence in the 24 Town Centres with the highest rates of crime. In the first 2 weeks of February 2022 the Harlesden Team were met by a number of members of the community including local councillors, ward panel members, and youth leaders all of whom told that they and the members of public they spoke with all had the same concerns about antisocial behaviour in Harlesden making it into somewhere people did not want to visit. The behaviour they listed were street drinking, loitering, the open supply and use of drugs, street prostitution and the open "cat calling" of women as they walked in the streets.

Harlesden is in the London Borough of BRENT. BRENT is one of the most diverse boroughs in the UK and from the 1st APRIL 2021 and to the 1st APRIL 2022 received 13533 reports of ANTI SOCIAL BEHAVIOUR (ASB).

These fell into 10 categories being:

- Littering / Drugs Paraphernalia

ASB - Personal
 Street Drinking
 ASB - Nuisance
 Prostitution Related Activity

Prostitution Related Activity
ASB - Environmental

Noise

Nuisance CallsRowdy or Inconsiderate Behaviour

Begging and Vagrancy

The Ward Boundary for HARLESDEN received 4239 reports of ANTI SOCIAL BEHAVIOUR creating 31.32% of the ASB recorded in BRENT.

I will refer to Crime Intel Reports, CADS, DARIS, MERLIN and Crime Reports in this statement along with my own local knowledge in the area.

The following sections are concerns from persons with community concerns. Most residents have chosen to remain anonymous as they are afraid of reprisals.

ANNOYMOUS - local resident:

...I have lived here for 19 years and the anti-social behaviour has gotten progressively worse. We, the residents have been complaining about it for over 3 years now and the reality is nothing has changed. Our council tax increases each year and the council have very little if any presence in our area. Now that the weather is warmer both sides of Park Parade are frequented purely by men and men only cafes. I walk past the alcoholic drug dealer who sits on Park Parade everyday. He is there from 8am or before. Then in the afternoon I have to walk past loads of men just loitering on Park Parade. These men do not live here.

My biggest concern is for the safeguarding of the many school children who pass through here each day. On my corner the drug dealers change, one group comes, another goes. They tend to frequent down the sideway of 19A Park Parade which is actually on Harlesden Gardens or number 4 Harlesden Gardens (currently up for rent). Again the same youths I saw at 6.30pm when I arrived home were still loitering there at 10.30pm when I went to bed. They left a mess on the street pizza boxes, cans etc. They were making loud anti social noise. I have reported nocturnal activities to the police but they can only do so much. As everyone else said enough is enough. We live in a multi-cultural diverse area which many of us love which is being blighted by people who have not care or concern for residents or the community.



I hear a lot from my end. It started around 6.30 when I heard a really aggressive man shouting down his phone walking up and down alongside the laundrette. You need to see it to believe it. My neighbour arrived while this was going on as I was greeting them at the door we couldn't hear each other speak which made me really angry so I crossed the road and shouted at this horrible man to stop shouting. I am aware that I am putting my safety at risk by doing this.

If the police/Council think that the café customers are a nice bunch think again.

THESE CAFÉ'S NEED TO CLOSE AT 6PM. NO-ONE IS BUYING COFFEE OR CAKE AT 10/11/12PM AT NIGHT. WHY ON EARTH HAS THE COUNCIL ALLOWED 12PM CLOSE WHEN THEY DON'T COOK ANY FOOD. ITS BECOME A BIKERS/DEALERS HANGOUT. It is not a café!

It's 11pm. I need to sleep, only got a couple of hours last night.

The end of Leghorn road junction with Park Parade is like a circus. A load of hyped up frenzied males all shouting and jumping around. Police have not attended. Called again to find out why. I'm told that there's no units available. There's 30 in the queue waiting for police to attend. We're not going to get a look in. I'm so stressed in my own house. Got windows and doors shut but still get woken with the shouting through the night. I wonder how many days this is going to go in for before someone does something to stop them. We've had years of this and we can't go through another summer of this.

ANNOYMOUS - local resident

There are several cafes on or around Park Parade which appear to have implications in ASB, drugs etc. Camelia Lounge, 36 Park Parade:

There appears to be some associated drug dealing which usually takes place on the recessed doorstep of the adjacent property, 34 Park Parade which has previously been reported. It is noted that in the last week workmen brought the door forward to the pavement edge so there is no longer a hidden recess to conduct deals. The worst problem with this business is that the customers park their cars on double yellow lines and scooters on the pavement. That may not seem relevant but the busy/chaotic street scene provides cover for other activities to hide in plain sight. Civil Enforcement Officers need police help to prevent such illegal parking

- 1 All Cafes: they are aimed at an all-male clientele and seem to be open from first thing in the morning to very late at night. The local residents have never really worked out how they can afford to stay open and be profitable looking at the fact they only really offer tea/ coffee and light refreshments? Other cafés that aim at other markets have been unable to stay open due to rent/rates/energy bills etc.
- 2 The Cafes also attracts a number of males that deal in drugs and other forms of petty criminal activity. This has been seen by local residents. Shop owners are offered presumably stolen goods as they come out with plastic bags!
- 3 We have seen/heard confrontations between rival gangs over drug dealing in the street. Again all males involved.
- 4 Often large groups of scooter owners will descend into the area for big football matches blocking the streets/pavements. All male.
- 5 The pavements themselves are reduced in width by men standing/ smoking hash in the entrances to buildings in Park parade and it's not unknown for the same in Sellons Avenue. 99% of the time these are males!
- 6 Often we see/confront members of this community looking through our dustbins saying they have mislaid their keys. All male.
- 7 Drugs have been stored/found in these bins or the hedges, and who knows what else have been left there.
- 8 The lawlessness of these streets encourages other anti-social behaviour such as loud, late night conversations either through their car-phones or in groups, motor bikes revving up late at night, public urination down the side streets and general waste and litter discarded on the pavements. All male.

We see a large number of men hanging around the section between Harlesden Gardens and Springwell Avenue which is just off Park Parade. More often than not based out in the street rather than inside a property and yes it does concern me for my wife and also my teenage daughter if either have to return late at night.

In summary:

As a Police Constable who has worked in Brent for over 2 years now. I can confirm that Police are working tireless in combating these ASB offences. The demonstrative views of local community members above paints a clear picture, which describes fear, shock and other emotions and often financial loss for local businesses. As Police officers we are committed in determination to work with the local community to improve the situation on PARK PARADE and making Harlesden and Brent a safer and happier place to live.

On WEDNESDAY 2nd JUNE 2021 Police executed two drugs warrants at CAMELIA LOUNGE 36 PARK PARADE NW10 4JE and Inside both cafes officers found substantive amount of class B drugs mainly behind counters. Some of them cut and ready for sale from under the counter

some of them in larger blocks hidden in different places. In consequence, officers arrested five people for drugs offences with investigation ongoing. On my personal opinion, both cafes are the reasons and epicentres of drugs supply on PARK PARADE NW10.

On THURSDAY 18TH JULY 2022 Police executed three drugs warrants at CAMELIA LOUNGE, 36 PARK PARADE. NW10 4JE.

PARADE, NW10 4JE, Inside CAMELIA LOUNGE there was hash which was individually wrapped, near by to scales, cash hidden, and a large knife which had hash and cling film residue. This shows the previous warrants conducted meant nothing to CAMELIA LOUNGE owners/staff members as they have carried on with there criminal behaviour, and have no care for the law.

I am the above named person, and my details are known to police. I have been living in HARLESDEN now for 28 years, most of these years I have been living close to PARK PARADE, and these cafes. They have affected myself and other residents for over 4 years now. This is causing me and other residents to fear walking down PARK PARADE, due to the anti social behaviour, and large groups of men gathered by these cafes.

CAMELIA LOUNGE has been causing anti social behaviour for the past 8 years, there has been previous warrants done on the premises which I assisted police with. Nothing has changed since the previous warrant. They are still dealing drugs from the premises. I have witnessed the males sitting in CAMELIA LOUNGE, then walking down the road to sell the drugs. I have seen these exchanges take place. I am in the local residents group where the local residents have complained about people smoking drugs outside CAMELIA LOUNGE, or where the males pull up on the pavement outside the cafes, they go in and leave empty handed and then walk to LEGHORN ROAD which is just off PARK PARADE, and smoke the cannabis.

The customers of CAMELIA LOUNGE usually drive their mopeds up and down PARK PARADE, doing wheelies, racing and revving their engines. This can sometimes happen all night, especially on the weekends. These moped drivers, park on the pavement and due to there being so many of them the pavement by CAMELIA LOUNGE is completely blocked. This makes me walk on the road to avoid them. The males congregating in large groups causes a large noise nuisance, this wakes me up every single night after 12pm. I cant have my windows open during the hot summer nights, as it is unbearable to listen to the screaming and shouting all night.

I have been in this post for 4 years and my job entails delivering an effective anti-social behaviour service for Brent, dealing with resident complaints, taking suitable enforcement action where necessary, and coordinating partnership problem solving forums for the resolution of embedded community safety problems within a specified locality.

During my time within the team, there have been a number of complaints regarding Park Parade NW10. These complaints range from various anti social behaviour, such as loitering, drug taking and alleged drug dealing in the neighbourhood. These reports are from local residents and partners of the London Borough of Brent Council.

Park Parade NW10 is situated within walking distance of Willesden Junction Station as well as local shops and amenities. There are a number of premises within the neighbourhood that operate as cafes.

During my role a number of complainants have witnessed anti social behaviour such as, individuals loitering, drug taking and drug dealing at certain venues in the area, namely;

- I am employed by the London Borough of Brent as a Licensing Community Protection Officer within the Community Protection Team. Amongst other duties, I enforce the Licensing Act 2003.
- 2. Prior to working in the Community Protection team, I worked in the Licensing team for 17 years until November 2021. Park Parade has always been the subject of complaints. In most recent years, these complaints have surrounded the cafes in the immediate area, because of the number of males that congregate outside or in close proximity of the premises entrance.
- 3. From a Licensing perspective, these cafes do not supply alcohol, music and hot drink or food between 23.00 05.00 hrs and therefore do not require a Premises licence. However, this does not prevent the cafes from opening until late, as there are no legal requirements to prevent them from doing so. I then ask myself, if the businesses are not opening for any of the above purposes, for what reason would they need to remain open until such a late hour?
- 4. Historically, the culture surrounding making complaints in Harlesden in comparison to other wards in the Borough, has always been difficult. Residents will verbally explain what is wrong but the moment this is requested in writing, they become reluctant to complain any further, whether it be anonymously or otherwise, as they fear retaliation. More recently, residents have become even more reluctant to complain. The issues are present for them in relation

to these cafes, including as they state; drug dealing, fighting, loud telephone calls, parking in residents bays, defecation, urination and litter that is thrown in the street, but they are too fearful to put this in writing.

5. Having previously covered the Licensing officer in relation to enforcement work in Park Parade, I have usually felt intimidated by the males presence. They normally stare or leer when I'm passing and never break their stare until I have fully walked past. When the staring includes a number of males, this can feel extremely intimidated and uncomfortable. Crossing the road, isn't usually an option, as there are the same types of cafes on both sides of the street. I only have to visit Park Parade on a number of occasions so cannot imagine how the residents must feel on a daily basis.

This statement outlines the principle threat of street offences: prostitution, begging, street Drug taking and associated increase of violence with injury seen in the area denoted below. It is evidentially clear from local community members and local strategic partners that these low level anti-social behaviours (ASB) are having a notable impact and effect on people's lives, their lifestyles and their feelings of safety. Indeed for some, this impact has a longer lasting effect.

The Metropolitan Police Service and Brent Borough are experiencing increased levels of serious ASB with a unique problem blighting the Ward of Harlesden, NW10.

The scale of the problem- call demand from public:

To assist with the interpretation of figures when mentioning ASB the following code-type calls have been utilised for the below regional and local pictures. Data is gained from the call handling system DARIS and lags public seeking police assistance, these figures show the whole of the BRENT BOROUGH from 01 APRIL 2021 TO 01 APRIL 2022:

- 100 Littering / Drugs Paraphernalia
- 1250 ASB Personal
- 56 Street Drinking
- 11647 ASB Nuisance
- 82 Prostitution Related Activity
- 374 ASB Environmental
- 1475 Noise
- 10 Nuisance Calls
- 7236 Rowdy or Inconsiderate Behaviour
- 377 Begging and Vagrancy


The total amount of ASB calls in this period for the borough of Brent is 13533 with 4239 in the Ward Boundary of Harlesden alone — 31.32% of the demand.

Location:

Brent is one of the most diverse boroughs in the UK. The equality characteristics have an important influence on the changing identities and needs of local people. Main factors within Harlesden seen in Brent Councils last consensus (2011* most up to date data):

- Harlesden holds a 17162 population
- It is the smallest Ward by hectare out of the 21 Wards of Brent
- There is a 67% black, Asian and Minority Ethnic population
- 2nd lowest Ward for family income.

We have identified the hotspot of Craven Park and the surrounding ½ mile area. This area is a busy residential area with a transient population, with a night-time economy from public houses, licensed premises and food outlets. Offences are primarily alcohol and drug related, occur throughout the week and peak between 2100-0700.




In Summary:

As the Inspector with responsibility for HARLESDEN TOWN CENTRE TEAM in the ward of over 30% of the ASB demand I believe it is absolutely imperative that the issue of ASB and related offences listed are effectively tackled from a diverse range of angles and within a wider partnership framework involving the police, community, operational and strategic partners including those within the criminal justice arena. Brent Police has worked tirelessly with partners in combating these offences which are on the increase. Taking into account the

sheer volume of impacted people, financial loss and creation of fear has a dramatic impact upon the community and prospective victims.

The demonstrative views of our partners and other local community members above paints a clear picture, which describes fears, shock and other emotions, financial loss, whilst other describe the community changing their life styles as a result and the lasting impact. I remain absolutely committed in my determination to work with the local community, local, regional and national partners - including the Criminal Justice Partners and industry to tackle, prevent and otherwise bring to justice those offenders involved in conduct and put a stop to this offending and re-offending to meet our joint aims of making Brent the safest Borough in London. The impact to the community of our approach to dealing with ASB and Criminal Offences in the town centre is evident to see after a recent analysis of the post 8 weeks of the Harlesden Town Centre Team being launched in February 2022 we have seen a 9.2% reduction in overall crime and a 90% reduction in ASB calls to HIGH STREET, HARLESDEN after concentrated police activity. We have seen a reduction in five major crime types since the introduction of the Town Centre Team and public trust and confidence in the police in Harlesden is at unprecedented levels according to the chair of the local Safer Neighbourhood Panel who represents 24 local leaders.

The dates analysed are 14/12/21 - 13/03/22 and 14/02/22 - 14/04/22 (using committed date) where offences have occurred within the Harlesden Town Centre Team (TCT) footprint.

The TCT was established on the 14th February, so these dates have been chosen to establish subsequent changes and trends.

Across all crimes, there has been a reduction of 9.2% (n=24).

As shown in table 1, there have been reductions across five of the major classification crime types, including violence. For three classifications, there has been no change. For two classifications, there have been increases.

Although not tabulated, when compared to figures from February – April 2021, all offences have risen. This is not surprising, as this time period covered a national lockdown and crime was significantly lower pan London. Harlesden was in line with this trend.

This Court submission is in support of this incorporated approach to ensure a long term approach to deal with our identified persistent offenders and venues.

In the lease agreement on PAGE 13 CLAUSE J NO UNDESIRABLE ACTIVITIES it states "NOT TO USE OR OCCUPY THE PREMISES FOR OR IN CONNECTION WITH ANY ILLEGAL OR IMMORAL PURPOSE OR ANY PURPOSE WHICH MAY CAUSE THE LANDLORDS PROPERTY OR ANY OTHER PROPERTY NOT TO COMPLY WITH ANY APPLICABLE LAW."

I do not live around the area however have been told by ESTATE AGENTS that residents are unhappy due to the open drug dealing in HARLESDEN.

Should this have been sold from my premises I do not support this behaviour or illegal activity under any circumstances.

I am employed by the London Borough of Brent as a Licensing Enforcement Officer. I have been in this role since 23/05/2022. In this capacity I am authorised to exercise duties under the Licensing Act 2003.

On Wednesday 07/09/2022 London Borough of Brent Licensing received notification from The Metropolitan Police that a Closure Order had been issued on 02/09/2022 at Willesden Magistrates Court under Section 80 of the Anti-Social Behaviour, Crime and Policing Act 2014 against Camelia Lounge, 36 Park Parade, NW10 4JE. This closure order has now triggered review hearing as Camilia Lounge has a Premises Licence number 144388 that was granted under the Licensing Act 2003 on 11/09/2006 by Brent Council, Licensing Authority for the area of the Borough of Brent. The holder of the Premises Licence since 11/09/2006 is shown as Mr. Gopal K Gupta. There has been no Designated Premises Supervisor in place since May 2019.

The Closure Order was issued for a period of 8 weeks from 19.00 hours on 02/09/2022 until 19.00 hours on 28/09/2022. This has now triggerd a review hearing and The Metropolitan Police has submitted the evidence used for the Closure Order for use in the review hearing.

I have conducted a search on our Licensing record for Camilia Lounge, 36 Park Parade, NW10 4JE with two complaints recorded against the premises.

- 1. 22/03/2020 Complaint by local resident about the premises breaching COVID restrictions.
- 2. 07/07/2019 Complaint by local resident about noise and ASB outside Camilia Lounge.

Having read through the police evidence there appears to be a history of drugs and drug dealing associated with Camilia Lounge. Drug warrants executed by police at this premises over a period of 15 months indicates cannabis being dealt from this premises. On both occasions Class B cannabis drugs were found behind the serving counter in individual wraps ready for selling with larger cannabis blocks, scales, cash, cling film and a large knife. This would clearly indicate drug dealing from the premises.

The Home Office Revised Guidance issued under section 182 of the Licensing Act 2003 gives clear guidance in relation to reviews arising in connection with crime.

Para 11.27 states - There is certain criminal activity that may arise in connection with licensed premises which should be treated particularly seriously. There is a long list of crimes related to the use of the licensed premises, one of which covers:

• for the sale and distribution of drugs controlled under the Misuse of Drugs Act 1971 and the laundering of the proceeds of drugs crime;

Para 11.28 states - It is envisaged that licensing authorities, the police, the Home Office (Immigration Enforcement) and other law enforcement agencies, which are responsible authorities, will use the review procedures effectively to deter such activities and crime. Where reviews arise and the licensing authority determines that the crime prevention objective is being undermined through the premises being used to further crimes, it is expected that revocation of the licence – even in the first instance – should be seriously considered.

The view of the Licensing Authority is that Camilia Lounge has seriously undermined the Licensing Objective relating to the Prevention of Crime and Disorder. I respectfully ask the Alcohol and Entertainment Licensing Sub-Committee to consider REVOKING the premises licence for Camilia Lounge.

Annex 1 – Mandatory conditions

No Irresponsible Drinks Promotions

- (1) The responsible person must ensure that staff on relevant premises do not carry out, arrange or participate in any irresponsible promotions in relation to the premises.
- (2) In this paragraph, an irresponsible promotion means any one or more of the following activities, or substantially similar activities, carried on for the purpose of encouraging the sale or supply of alcohol for consumption on the premises—
 - 1. (a)games or other activities which require brageofrage,

or are designed to require or encourage, individuals to— (i) drink a quantity of alcohol within a time limit (other than to drink alcohol sold or supplied on the premises before the cessation of the period in which the responsible person is authorised to sell or supply alcohol), or (ii) drink as much alcohol as possible (whether within a time limit or otherwise);

- (b) provision of unlimited or unspecified quantities of alcohol free or for a fixed or discounted fee to the public or to a group defined by a particular characteristic in a manner which carries a significant risk of undermining a licensing objective;
- (c) provision of free or discounted alcohol or any other thing as a prize to encourage or reward the purchase and consumption of alcohol over a period of 24 hours or less in a manner which carries a significant risk of undermining a licensing objective;
- (d) selling or supplying alcohol in association with promotional posters or flyers on, or in the vicinity of, the premises which can reasonably be considered to condone, encourage or glamorise anti-social behaviour or to refer to the effects of drunkenness in any favourable manner;
- (e) dispensing alcohol directly by one person into the mouth of another (other than where that other person is unable to drink without assistance by reason of disability).

Free Water

The responsible person must ensure that free potable water is provided on request to customers where it is reasonably available.

Age Verification Policy

- (1) The premises licence holder or club premises certificate holder must ensure that an age verification policy is adopted in respect of the premises in relation to the sale or supply of alcohol.
- (2) The designated premises supervisor in relation to the premises licence must ensure that the supply of alcohol at the premises is carried on in accordance with the age verification policy.
- (3) The policy must require individuals who appear to the responsible person to be under 18 years of age (or such older age as may be specified in the policy) to produce on request, before being served alcohol, identification bearing their photograph, date of birth and either—
- (a) a holographic mark, or
- (b) an ultraviolet feature.

Small Measures to be Available

The responsible person must ensure that—

- (a) where any of the following alcoholic drinks is sold or supplied for consumption on the premises (other than alcoholic drinks sold or supplied having been made up in advance ready for sale or supply in a securely closed container) it is available to customers in the following measures—
- (i) beer or cider: ½ pint;
- (ii) gin, rum, vodka or whisky: 25 ml or 35 ml; and
- (iii) still wine in a glass: 125 ml;
- (b) these measures are displayed in a menu, price list or other printed material which is available to customers on the premises; and
- (c) where a customer does not in relation to a sale of alcohol specify the quantity of alcohol to be sold, the customer is made aware that these measures are available

Minimum Price of Alcohol

1.A relevant person shall ensure that no alcohol is sold or supplied for consumption on or off the premises for a price which is less than the permited price.

- 2.For the purposes of the condition set out in paragraph 1—
- (a)—dutyll is to be construed in accordance with the Alcoholic Liquor Duties Act 1979;
- (b)—permitted pricell is the price found by applying the formula—

$P = D + (D \times V)$

where—

- (i)P is the permitted price,
- (ii)D is the amount of duty chargeable in relation to the alcohol as if the duty were charged on the date of the sale or supply of the alcohol, and
- (iii)V is the rate of value added tax chargeable in relation to the alcohol as if the value added tax were charged on the date of the sale or supply of the alcohol;
- (c)—relevant personl means, in relation to premises in respect of which there is in force a premises
 - (i)the holder of the premises licence,
 - (ii)the designated premises supervisor (if any) in respect of such a licence, or
 - (iii)the personal licence holder who makes or authorises a supply of alcohol under such a licence;
- (d) —relevant personl means, in relation to premises in respect of which there is in force a club premises certificate, any member or officer of the club present on the premises in a capacity which enables the member or officer to prevent the supply in question; and
- (e)—valued added taxll means value added tax charged in accordance with the Value Added Tax Act 1994.
- 3.Where the permitted price given by Paragraph (b) of paragraph 2 would (apart from this paragraph) not be a whole number of pennies, the price given by that sub-paragraph shall be taken to be the price actually given by that sub- paragraph rounded up to the nearest penny.
- 4.(1) Sub-paragraph (2) applies where the permitted price given by Paragraph (b) of paragraph 2 on a day (—the first dayll) would be different from the permitted price on the next day (—the second dayll) as a result of a change to the rat e of duty or value added tax.
- (2)The permitted price which would apply on the first day applies to sales or supplies of alcohol which take place before the expiry of the period of 14 days beginning on the second day.

Requirement for a DPS

- (1) No supply of alcohol may be made under the premises licence-
- (a)at a time when there is no designated premises supervisor in respect of the premises licence, or
- (b)at a time when the designated premises supervisor does not hold a personal licence or their personal licence is suspended.
- (2) Every supply of alcohol under the premises licence must be made or authorised by a person who holds a personal licence.

Door Supervisors and Security Staff to be Licensed by the SIA (when required)

Where the licence includes a condition that at specified times one or more individuals must be at the premises to carry out a security activity, each individual must be licensed by the Security Industry Authority, with the following exceptions:

- a) premises where the premises licence authorises plays or films
- b) any occasion mentioned in paragraph 8(3)(b) or (c) of Schedule 2 to the Private Security Industry Act 2001 (premises being used exclusively by a club with a club premises certificate, under a temporary event notice authorising plays or films or under a gaming licence), or
- c) any occasion within paragraph 8(3)(d) of Schedule 2 to the Private Security Industry Act 2001

Film Classification When required

- (i) The admission of children to the exhibition of any film must be restricted in accordance with the recommendation of the designated film classification body unless section (ii) applies.
- (ii) Where the licensing authority notifies the holder of the licence that this subsection applies the admission of children must be restricted in accordance with any recommendation made by the licensing authority.

In this section-

"children" means persons aged under 18; and

film classification body" means the person or persons designated as the authority

under section 4 of the Video Recordings Act 1984 (c. 39) (authority to determine suitability of video works for classification).

Annex 2 – Conditions consistent with the operating schedule

- 1 CCTV shall be installed and maintained in a working condition.
- 2 All CCTV recordings shall be kept for 31 days and shall be made available to police and licensing officers if requested.
- Any failure with any CCTV equipment shall be reported to the police and licensing officers as soon as practicable and immediate steps shall be taken to put the equipment back into action and the premises shall not be used for licensable activities unless with prior agreement with the police..
- A minimum of 2 door supervisors in a ratio of at least 1 to every 50 customers, shall be employed from 21:00 hours on any day when the premises are open for the sale of alcohol past midnight.
- 5 Customers shall not be permitted to take open glass containers outside the premises as defined on the plan submitted to and approved by the Licensing Authority.
