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MINUTES OF THE WELSH HARP JOINT CONSULTATIVE COMMITTEE Thursday 16 January 2020 at 7.00 pm AGENDA ITEM 3

3. Minutes of the previous meeting

RESOLVED: -

that the minutes of the previous meeting held on 17th July 2019 be approved as an accurate record of the meeting.

4. Matters arising

5. Management Plan (Barnet)

Mr Matthew Gunyon (Greenspaces Service Manager, Barnet) introduced the report and provided updates on matters relating to the on-going site management issues during this quarter as follows:

The Greenspaces Team continued to work closely with the Barnet Community Safety Team, the Local Police and other partners to identify and remove illegal encampments. The encampment discussed at the previous meeting located in York Park was cleared in partnership with Barratts, Canals and Rivers Trust and Barnet Council. A team attended site after the event and undertook a cleansing of the area in question.

The Greenspaces Team, Community Safety and Councillor John Hart undertook a site visit during which evidence of two small fly tips was noted in addition to litter in and around the area. The Community Safety Officer agreed to arrange to have the area litter picked by the Community Payback Team. Mr Gunyon urged members to take pictures of incidents of fly tipping and report them to the BarnetCST@barnet.gov.uk

In the ensuing discussions, members complained about illegal parking on grass verges particularly during event days. They expressed a view that the introduction of mobile CCTV would assist in deterring fly tipping and parking on grass verges. Mr Gunyon advised that mobile CCTV would not be as effective as it required consistent wifi connectivity.

Mr Gunyon updated the Committee that the Council's contractors were currently reviewing the results of the consultation and looking at options to address concerns raised in the consultation relating to West Hendon Playing Fields Master Plan. This will be reported to a future date of the Environment Committee in either March or June 2020 for approval and adoption. Once adopted the Council would look to develop a business case to help inform the next stage of the Master Plan. He continued that one of the tennis courts in West Hendon Playing Fields was being converted into a Basketball Court with posts erected. The Council was currently seeking quotations to complete an overlay of the playing surface along with new lines.

Members sought further details about the Master Plan designs and also expressed concerns raised about environmental impact of the plastic pitches including the astro turf. They also enquired about planned consultations for the Master Plan.

Mr Gunyon advised that the Council had made every effort to mitigate all concerns previously raised, adding that the Master Plan would not impact on SSSI areas. He added that the Council had consulted all statutory agencies on the Master Plan which at this stage was a spatial plan and once agreed, would lead to proper designs. He informed the Committee that the Master Plan would be published to Barnet's community engagement on-line portal and members of this Committee would be engaged in future consultations.

6. Management Plan (Brent)

Mr Leslie Williams (Brent) gave the following updates since the last meeting, drawing Members' attention to The Welsh Harp / Brent Reservoir Management Plan, appended to the report, which included an Action Plan. The Action Plan listed current year progress and actions that may require a longer time- frame and/or for the resources to be identified to undertake the action. He highlighted the following:

Marshland work: Officers of the Canal & River Trust, Brent Council, and members of the Welsh Harp Sailing Association had met to discuss continuation of the work commenced last winter. In some areas of the Welsh Harp Open Space and at Neasden Recreation Ground tree growth during recent years in the marshland and

nearby areas had shaded marshland, reduced views of the Reservoir and increased wind-shadows into the reservoir which affected water wind sports.

While tree growth in many locations should be encouraged, there were also areas where more of a balance is necessary, for example, where scarce habitat such as marshland is at risk. As previously, the aim of work would be to seek to re-open some areas of marshland, acid grassland and rough grassland, while retaining clumps of trees and individual trees along the edge of the reservoir. Consent has been sought from Natural England to progress that.

Public Spaces Protection Order. Brent Council's Cabinet considered a report detailing the Public Spaces Protection Order on 9th September 2019. The report and Cabinet decisions including future implementation were available on the Brent Council website and at:

Meadow areas had been enhanced at Neasden Recreation Ground. The increase in longer-grass habitat in the selected areas at Neasden Recreation Ground appears to have been a success. The annual cutting should have taken place by the time of the Committee meeting. Where strips were additionally seeded, some areas that were missed will be re-seeded in 2020.

Welsh Harp / Birchen Grove Car Park. In response to concerns raised by residents and car park users about the use of the car park for off-road car driving at speed, the Council had arranged for the installation of speed reduction ramps in the car park as a measure to reduce this issue. The measures would enable the use of the car park for car parking and also enable pedestrian access to the Welsh Harp. The work involved was now scheduled between 13th - 24th January 2020 which may affect the use of the car park during those times.

Members expressed concerns about lorries which were parking on pavements in Birchen Grove, causing damage to the paving stones and to the detriment of residential amenity. In response, Mr Williams undertook to inform the Council's Enforcement Team so that officers could take speedy and appropriate measures to address the problem.

1.0 Purpose of the Report

1.1 This report presents progress on the Brent Reservoir / Welsh Harp Management Plan since the last meeting of the Committee and during the 2020/21 year to date. The Management Plan is jointly managed by the three main land-holding organisations: Brent Council, the London Borough of Barnet, and the Canal & River Trust.

2.0 Recommendation(s)

2.1 Members are asked to note the Report.

3.0 Detail

- 3.1 The current version of the Welsh Harp / Brent Reservoir Management Plan, (dated 15 March 2016) is available on the Brent Council website at https://www.brent.gov.uk/services-for-residents/culture-leisure-and-parks/parks-and-allotments/park-finder/welsh-harp-reservoir/
- 3.2 The Welsh Harp / Brent Reservoir Management Plan includes an Action Plan that lists current year progress and actions that may require a longer time-frame and/or for the resources to be identified to undertake the action. For

this committee the Action Plan is updated as Appendix A. The 'Progress' column summarises current progress. Additional notes are provided in the following paragraphs:

3.3 Marshland work: Following the work in the winters of 2018/19 and 2019/20, the Canal & River Trust and volunteers of the Welsh Harp Sailing Association have organised a continuation of the marshland work. The earlier work has been successful in encouraging the herbaceous marshland flora and in reopening views to the reservoir, while retaining spaced trees and groups of trees on the shoreline. Preparation and application for consents was organised during the summer of 2020. Work on site commenced in early September 2020. Work has been conducted taking account of current Covid regulations at the time of the work; and has included a break of a few weeks to re-access the situation. Projects to date have been on the northern shore, towards and around the pond near to the boundaries of the two Boroughs. It is planned for works to continue until the end of February 2021, given the bird breeding season from 1st March to end of August.

3.4 Three reasons for the work are:

- Habitat and wildlife: The marshland and the marshland flora are valuable for wildlife. As the marshland is only a few metres wide, the marshland habitat is important at this location. The growth of the trees shades the ground flora. The aim is to reduce the cover of the trees in the marshland while retaining a selection of the marshland trees.
- Water wind-sports: Trees on the edge of the reservoir create a wind shadow that can extend over the reservoir and which reduces the wind for water sports.
- Landscape and amenity: The growth of the trees can reduce the view of the reservoir and the views across the reservoir.
- 3.5 Consent from Natural England identifies the boundaries within which the work can proceed and lists conditions. Locally, notes from the previous work has been summarised into a guidance note which aims to act as a style-guide to the work. In particular to identify which types of trees are priorities for retaining near to the water and the types of trees that are a priority for coppicing.
- 3.6 The coppicing does often reveal accumulated litter including washed-up material in the marshland, while at the same time provides temporary access opportunities for clearing the litter before the marshland flora regrows.
- 3.7 Public Spaces Protection Order. Parks. Following the report to Brent Council's Cabinet of 9th September 2019, implementation of the Public Space Protection Orders is proceeding in parks.

- 3.8 Meadow areas: The meadow areas, amongst the amenity grassland of Neasden Recreation Ground, are due for an annual cut in the early autumn of 2020.
- 3.9 Healthy Walks programme:

The walking programme recommenced in August 2020 with walkers following social distancing guidelines. - 3.10 Cycling in Neasden Recreation Ground: On 25th November 2019 a decision was made at full Council to revoke a byelaw and to allow cycling in some of Brent's parks and open spaces. Cycling is considered to provide benefits for health and for sustainable transport. The intention is to promote safe and responsible cycling. Detailed surveys and observations of all parks and open spaces covered by the byelaw have been completed to identify any potential areas of conflict between cyclists and other park users, these areas included:
 - Entrances
 - play areas
 - outdoor gyms
 - cafes and picnic areas
 - paths that may be too narrow to allow safe sharing of the space, or
 - places with a steep topography that may affect cycling speeds as hills can encourage faster and slower paces.
- 3.11 Where potential conflicts and risks have been identified, mitigation measures are recommended which include; '5mph' signs and surface markings to reduce speed and encourage safe cycling and 'no cycling' signs in areas where the paths are too narrow or close to park facilities. Appendix B includes details of the signs identified for parks in Brent including for Neasden Recreation Ground.

4.0 Financial Implications

- 4.1 The Brent Reservoir / Welsh Harp Management Plan provides recommendations for works to be undertaken. Works are only undertaken when approved by the service responsible for delivering the works within existing approved budgets.
- 4.2 The Action Plan 2020/21 (Appendix A) actions are achievable over varying time-frames, though many are not affordable within existing budgets in the short term. More details of works are included in Appendix A."

5.0 Legal Implications

5.1 Brent Reservoir / Welsh Harp is a designated 'Site of Special Scientific Interest ('SSSI'). Section 28E of the Wildlife and Countryside Act 1981 as amended by the Countryside and Rights of Way Act 2000 ('CROW') and the Natural Environment and Rural Communities Act 2006 (NERC) sets out the duties in relation to SSSIs. Land owners or occupiers, and also public bodies, are required to give notice to and consult with Natural England where they wish to carry out, or cause or permit to be carried out any operation in an area of land that is of special interest by reason of any of its flora, fauna, or geological or physiographical features (this requirement applies to operations

within a SSSI, and to operations outside the SSSI that may affect the features of interest). Natural England will issue consent, which may have conditions or refuse consent. It is a criminal offence to carry out a listed operation without Natural England's consent or to ignore any conditions of a consent which may result in an unlimited fine and a restoration order. CROW (and section 28G of the Wildlife and Countryside Act 1981) places a duty on all public bodies to take reasonable steps, consistent with the proper exercise of the authority's functions, to further the conservation and enhancement of a SSSI. When advice is obtained from Natural England prior to carrying out the works, an explanation of how the Council has taken into account any advice Natural England has given should be provided —

The Council must be able to show that it considered alternatives that could reduce the impact on the SSSI and the methods being used are those that cause as little damage as practicable to the land:-

The Council should demonstrate how it has assessed differing interests (including the special interests of the SSSI) before deciding to go ahead with the works.

- 5.2 It is good practice for landowners or occupiers to produce Management Plans for the SSSI, which when approved by Natural England, enable the carrying out of the works specified in the Management Plan. This can reduce the administrative work inherent in obtaining consent for individual items of management work.
- 5.3 The Natural Environment and Rural Communities Act 2006 requires that all public authorities in England and Wales, when exercising their statutory functions, must have regard to the conservation of biodiversity, so far as is consistent with the proper exercise of their functions.
- 5.4 Section 28Q of the Wildlife and Countryside Act 1981 requires the owner of land included in a SSSI to inform Natural England within 28 days of any changes in ownership or occupation of the site, including leases, easements and rights.

6.0 Equality Implications

6.1 Decision makers must have due regard to the public sector equality duty in making their decisions. The public sector equality duty is set out at section 149 of the Equality Act 2010 and is as follows:

A public authority must, in the exercise of its functions, have due regard to the need to:

- (a) eliminate discrimination, harassment, victimisation and any other conduct that is prohibited by or under this Act;
- (b) advance equality of opportunity between persons who share a relevant protected characteristic and persons who do not share it;
- (c) foster good relations between persons who share a relevant protected characteristic and persons who do not share it.

In terms of advancing equality of opportunity, this means to:

- (i) remove or minimise disadvantages suffered by persons who share a relevant protected characteristic that are connected to that characteristic;
- (ii) take steps to meet the needs of persons who share a relevant protected characteristic that are different from the needs of persons who do not share it;
- (iii) encourage persons who share a relevant protected characteristic to participate in public life or in any other activity in which participation by such persons is disproportionately low.

Summary

1. WHY THIS REPORT IS NEEDED

- 1.1 The Welsh Harp Joint Consultative Committee is comprised of Canals and Rivers Trust, Brent Council, Welsh Harp Conservation Group, Welsh Harp Sailing Association and Barnet Council. The committee is a consultative committee only and meets on a quarterly basis.
- 1.2 The committee is invited to note and make comments on the on-going site management issues during this quarter as follows:
- 1.3 <u>Illegal encampments</u>

The Greenspaces Team continue to work closely with the Barnet Community Safety Team, the Local Police and other partners to identify and remove encampments;

1.4 <u>Litter and Flytipping</u>

- 1.4.1 A request has been put to the Barnet Community Safety Team to consider the need for CCTV along Cool Oak Lane.
- 1.4.2 Fly Tipping should be reported to the BarnetCST@barnet.gov.uk
- 1.5 West Hendon Playing Fields Master Plan & Replacement Ball Court
 - 1.5.1 The Sports Hub Master Plans which covers West Hendon Playing Fields and Barnet/Kind George V Playing Fields Master plans were presented to the Environment Committee 12 March 2020

(https://barnet.moderngov.co.uk/ieListDocuments.aspx?Cld=695&Mld=9910&Ver=4), the committee approved the following recommendations;

- 1. That the Committee noted the outcomes of the public and stakeholder consultation on the draft Master Plan for Barnet and King George V Playing Fields.
- 2. That the Committee approved the Final Master Plan for Barnet and King George V Playing Fields.
- 3. That the Committee noted the outcomes of the public and stakeholder consultation on the draft Master Plan for West Hendon Playing Fields.
- 4. That the Committee approved the Final Master Plan for West Hendon Playing Fields including the inclusion of Woodfield Park in the Final Master Plan.
- 5. That the Committee noted that the Business Cases for the Sports Hubs for Barnet and King George V Playing Fields, and West Hendon Playing Fields will be reported to a future meeting of the Environment Committee and other Theme Committees as appropriate.

- 1.5.2 Key changes to the West Hendon proposal following the review of the consultation;
- 1.5.2.1 Relocation of car parking to Woodfield Park. The proposed car park would be 94 spaces compared to the 99 spaces provided in the Cool Oak Lane car park.
- 1.5.2.2 Relocation of the high ropes course to Woodfield Park.
- 1.5.2.3 Include a new pedestrian crossing point along Cool Oak Lane to provide safe access between West Hendon Playing Fields and Woodfield Park.
- 1.5.2.4 Simplified pedestrian / cycle route through SSSI and relocation of proposed bird hides.
- 1.5.2.5 Include increased planting to create a 'buffer zone' between the Astro Turf Pitches and Local Nature Reserve.
- 1.5.3 One of the tennis courts in West Hendon Playing Fields is being converted into a Basketball Court. Posts have been erected and we are seeking quotations to complete an overlay of the playing surface along with new lines.
- 1.5.3.1 Note these facilities are currently close due to the current government guidelines in relation to the COVID 19 Pandemic.

2. REASONS FOR RECOMMENDATIONS

2.1 The terms of reference of the Welsh Harp Joint Consultative Committee include that it considers and co-ordinates all the interests of recreation, leisure, maintenance and nature conservation with the object of protecting the Welsh Harp Reservoir and surrounding open land as a unique environment for both recreation and wildlife conservation.

The Local Authority has the power under Section 21 of the National Parks and Access to the Countryside Act 1949 to acquire, declare and manage nature reserves. However, English Nature must be consulted by the Authority in the use of the powers given by section 21. The 1949 Act states that a Local Nature Reserve (LNR) must be managed in such as a way to ensure that use of the site does not result in any damage to its natural features.
- 5.4.2 As set out in the Terms of Reference of the Joint Committee:

 "to consider and co-ordinate all the interests of recreation / leisure / maintenance / nature conservation and statutory requirements of the

 British Waterways Board and the Environment Agency at the Welsh Harp; with the object of protecting the Welsh Harp Reservoir and surrounding open land as a unique environment for both recreation and wildlife conservation".
- 5.4.3 Barnet's Constitution Article 8 Joint Arrangements- states at paragraph 8.1 that the Council may establish joint arrangements with one or more Local Authorities. Such arrangements may involve the appointment of a Joint Committee with these Local Authorities.

5.5 Risk Management

5.5.1 There are no risk management issues associated with this report.

Welsh Harp Reservoir (Brent Reservoir - London, NW9); minor scrub/tree clearance

I write on behalf of the West Hendon Partnership Board, a resident-led steering group, whose objective is to positively influence the regeneration of the West Hendon estate.

The Welsh Harp Reservoir, a site of special scientific interest (SSSI), is a much-loved local natural resource to this community that we all enjoy living next to. However, for most of the year the view of the water is largely hidden from the estate due to the proliferation of scrub and trees, only being semi-visible in the winter months when the vegetation has died off for another season.

With this in mind, the West Hendon Partnership Board approached Barnet Council earlier this year, enquiring if a small section of scrub and trees could be cleared from the Welsh Harp banks, to afford the residents of our estate a clear and direct view of the water front. The area chosen is limited in size with the intention of causing the least disruption.

We were pleased Barnet Council supported these indicative proposals, and working with the developer, Barratt Metropolitan LLP, a plan has been prepared setting out the extent of the proposed clearance from within the SSSI (appended to this letter).

As the primary statutory undertaker for matters relating to SSSI's in England, we hope you are in a position to approve this request, and we look forward to enjoying far greater views of the Welsh Harp, and its wildlife, from within the grounds of our estate and our homes.

Please note that I would like to delegate correspondence in this matter moving forward with regard to agreeing any conditions, or agreement of other technical matters, to Barnet Council and Barratt Metropolitan LLP.




