Proposal to procure a specialist Diversion from Offending and Early Intervention Programme. This report requests approval to invite tenders in respect of specialist services to support service users of all risk levels.

The current delivery contract is due to come to end following the final contract extension period. There continues to be a significant focus nationally on Serious Youth Violence, Brent has retained this as a key strategic priority within their Safer Brent Community Safety Strategy 2024 - 2026. National policy and legislation will be incorporated to ensure we meet compliance including reference to the introduction of the Police and Crime Plan for London 2025 - 2029.

The Local authority would seek to invite tenders to apply to deliver services in a borough which wishes to ensure that families have access to key support when most in need.

Wider public, partner consultations and data analytics, have also created an enhanced understanding of local need to support service specification and design. To ensure future delivery will continue to support service users.

The current contract following the final variation will continue until March 2026, following a comprehensive open market tendering process we will appoint a new provider (a period of mobilisation will be incorporated to ensure safe transition).

No, the project is additional intervention provided by a MOPAC LCPF grant and is not the council's duty.

We undertake regular monitoring and collation of data relating to equality as part of the contract including gender, disability, sexuality, ethnicity, and age (with particular interest in young victims and service users). The services are monitored on their ability to deliver effective services to specialist minoritised service users, and to link in with other local specialist partners to facilitate this. Equality considerations will be taken at all stages of procurement and services specification and design.

The current provider offers support to all genders and does not exclude access; we will ensure that this key element to accessing support is retained in the next procurement of services.

We will be seeking a provider who is able to address, remove or minimize disadvantages connected to a characteristic of a protected group; take steps to meet the needs of protected groups; and to encourage participation of protected groups in public life as well as to take reasonable steps to remove any barriers for disabled victim / survivors. Further consideration will be made to ensure an intersectional approach is provided.

Serious violence, gangs, gang related offending and exploitation continues to remain a concern for Brent, with links between Child Sexual Exploitation and County Lines. With over 20 gangs operating in Brent, gang offending and gang related violence remains a significant priority. The Exploitation Violence and Vulnerability Panel (EVVP) meet every two weeks and has seen an increase in referrals for youth intervention and support. With an older entrenched cohort involved in gangs and serious violence, there is more demand for intervention post 18, due to the limitation of statutory support services.

Previous evidence has shown that a well-run Violence and Vulnerability Programme that targets and supports those that require intervention can have a positive impact on the rehabilitation of such cohort and the communities they affect. This particular cohort causes harm to communities and individuals, costing London taxpayers the equivalent of £2.2 billion a year in criminal justice costs alone and require targeted and specific support to assist them with breaking the cycle of reoffending. Evidence shows that those that require intervention typically lead chaotic lives and have complex support needs. They are more likely to have been exposed to crime and violence themselves, often from a young age; have education and employment problems; and have learning difficulties or lack basic literacy and numeracy skills. Addressing each of these underlying issues is necessary to divert these individuals out of a life of crime and into a positive role within society.

London overall has seen an increase of crime, reaching 951,803 crime offences by 2024/25³. The number of knife or sharp instrument offences recorded by the police in London rose to approximately 16,344 in 2024/25, compared with 15,016⁴ in the previous year. While there are certainly multiple reasons for this trend, both police funding and officer numbers are important factors. In Brent from April 2021 – March 2022 we saw 372 knife crime offences⁵, with 134 offenders⁶ charged on the Integrated Offender Management (IOM) cohort during this same period. Since then, this programme has contributed to the reduction of the IOM cohort to 95⁻ charged between April 2024 and March 2025.

Serious violence, gangs, gang related offending and exploitation continues to remain a concern for Brent. With over 20<sup>8</sup> gangs operating in Brent, gang offending and gang related violence remains a significant priority.

Central to the Community Safety Team's strategy to reducing serious youth violence is the Exploitation Violence and Vulnerability Panel (EVVP) which meets every two weeks. Although there has been a decrease in referrals from 163 in 2023 to 140 in 2024<sup>9</sup>. This remains a considerable rate of referral which needs to be addressed. This includes a 14% increase in referrals for youth intervention and support since 2023<sup>10</sup>. As well as an older entrenched cohort involved in gangs and serious violence, which has led to additional demand for intervention post 18, due to the limitation of statutory support services.

Locally we have also seen that the number of gang affected young people is increasing and represented by a young cohort including some new emerging gangs/groups which are now affiliating with some of our long-standing gangs. Indeed, Brent is experiencing rising violence and exploitation, particularly among young people at risk of gang involvement, criminality and abuse. In 2024, Notifiable Offences increased by 7.5%<sup>11</sup> compared to 2023, with 18 – 24 years old most frequently victimised in Violence with injury offences<sup>12</sup>. Targeted intervention is essential to prevent cycles of victimisation, offending and pressure on public services.

The fundamental goal of the programme is to reduce serious violence, both through early interventions and post release in the community, leading to positive outcomes linked to the individual service users' needs

The Provider and its staff are expected to work in co-operation and liaise with all key partner agencies to ensure a complete family approach is devised and delivered to safeguard and reduce risk.
